

W. P. MYERS, LAWYER, DIES IN PORTLAND

William Pinkley Myers, veteran attorney and for many years one of Oregon's outstanding criminal lawyers, died at the Veterans' hospital in Portland Tuesday afternoon. He was 73 years of age.

Mr. Myers had been ill for a number of years, following his retirement from active law practice here in 1937.

He was the first district attorney of Jefferson county, serving on appointment by Governor Oswald West. His legal career continued for 16 years in central Oregon. He came to Klamath Falls in 1923.

He won notice as a criminal lawyer in many central Oregon cases, and handled a number of outstanding cases in this county.

Mr. Myers was a Spanish War veteran and a member of Herbert Applegate post, USWV. He taught school in his early years, and published two weekly newspapers, the Laidlaw Chronicle and the Culver Tribune. He was married to Stella Davis at La-hams, Okla., May 26, 1907. Survivors include his widow, Mrs. W. P. Myers of this city; two daughters, Emma Lou, Portland; Virginia Harper, Charleston, Ore.; a son, Second Lieutenant Theodore Ellis Myers, U. S. army; a son-in-law, Oscar Harper; two grandsons, Edwin Oscar and William Paul Harper; a daughter-in-law, Irene Myers; and two granddaughters, Joyce and Patricia Myers.

He was a member of the Christian church. Funeral services will be held at the Christian church here on Saturday at 2 p. m., in charge of officiating, with Rev. A. C. Bates officiating.
