The first time he was chasing an imaginary squirrel when he slipped in the snow and went over the cliff with a surprised yelp. His owner, William Ziegler, Rogue River national forest lookout observer, gave him up

for dead. But ten days later he found the dog climbing up a trail. His fall had been cushioned in soft snow.
