Harvey, captain of the tug, and Russell, vice president of the Russell Tugboat and Moorage company, owner, asked Federal Judge Claude McCulloch for additional time to plead.

Furnishings of hospital sun rooms at Camp White and completion of the company day rooms were the main topics of discussion. Maurice Spatz of Medford presided. Council members and Red Cross officials from Medford, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Camp White were in attendance. Leslie B. Wright, our local camp and hospital service chairman represented Klamath Falls at this meeting.

One-third of the hospital sun rooms will be furnished by the National Red Cross but the remainder will have to be taken care of locally. Needed for the rooms are draperies, smoking stands, additional chairs, radios, lamps, games and similar articles. If you have any of these articles that you can spare for the use of the soldiers, please call Red Cross headquarters.

PLANNING BOARD NOTES NW POWER

WASHINGTON, March 11 (P) Power possibilities in the Pacific Northwest, says the national resources planning board, may be more than three times the present 13,000,000-kilowatt total of all hydro-electric plants in the United States.

The board's report was presented to congress by President Roosevelt.

Describing the region as "unrivaled in its potentialities for development of irrigation and water power," the board says the three Columbia river dams now constructed—Rock Island, Bonneville and Grand Coulee—aggregate nearly 3,000,000 kilowatts of power.

"The potentialities of the Pacific Northwest region may be nearly 15 times that amount," the report adds, noting that eight other reservoirs are contemplated for the Columbia river system and that proposals for "at least 75 additional reservoirs are under consideration and many more undoubtedly will follow further investigation."

Possibilities of irrigation, the board said, "are almost as impressive," since "approximately 5,000,000 acres, or about one quarter of the total additional area in the nation susceptible of reclamation through irrigation is in this area." It said additional water supplies are available to supplement "deficient supplies now delivered to about 2,000,000 acres."
