## STOCK MARKET GAINS; DEALS TOP MILLIONS

NEW YORK, March 11 (AP)—Rallying power returned to the stock market today after three successive losing sessions and, with dealings again topping the million-share total, leaders retrieved fractions to 2 or more points.

Low-priced issues came out in sizeable blocks. Advances were well maintained near the close. Transfers approximated 1,400,000 shares.

Wall street was encouraged by the fact recent profit cashing on the 10-months' upswing was so well absorbed and investment demand, consequently, stiffened appreciably.

At new peaks for 1943 or longer were Texas and Pacific railway, Erie, Texas Co., Goodyear, Goodrich, Woolworth, Paramount Pictures, Bath Iron Works, Dresser Mfg., Allied Chemical, Allegheny Prior Preferred and Pepsi-Cola. Pleasing earnings statements buoyed several favorites. In front were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Santa Fe and Climax Molybdenum. Bonds rose with stocks.

## OREGON FARM PRODUCTION LOOKS GOOD

CORVALLIS, March 11 (AP)—The blueprint for 1943 agriculture production in Oregon is nearing completion, R. B. Taylor, chairman of Oregon's USDA war board, announced today.

The farm plan sign-up phase of the mobilization drive is about 80 per cent completed with nearly 40,000 Oregon farmers having recorded both their production plans and needs.

Farmers' intentions, as expressed on these signed farm plans, show that Oregon will go over the top on three important war crop goals, will make substantial increases in others, and will continue a high output of livestock products. Farmers admit that final success depends much on the amount of help they get from the cities in caring for and harvesting these record plantings Taylor reports.

## Spud Growers Can Get Special War Crop Advances

REDMOND, March 11 (AP)—Potato growers may obtain special war crop advances from the regional agricultural credit corporation, E. M. Wright, chairman of the Deschutes county USDA war board, said today.

These advances will be made to finance actual cash outlays for three or more acres, Wright said. If the grower follows principles of good farming and returns from the crop fail to repay the advance in full, the unrepaid balance will be cancelled, Wright explained.

## OPA Seeks to Plug Rent Control Leak

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—Seeking to plug a loophole in rent control, the office of price administration assumed authority today to require landlords of tourist cabins, auto courts, cabin camps and similar establishments to offer these living accommodations at monthly rates.

Heretofore, OPA said, the regulations had allowed many landlords to continue to charge their tenants daily rates although the tenants occupied cabins on a permanent basis.

## BOARDS ASKED TO DEFER FARM LABOR

PORTLAND, March 11 (AP)—Oregon's USDA county war boards were instructed today to request deferment of essential farm workers and to aid in the suppression of the meat black market.

"County war boards, under new war manpower commission authorities, are directed to initiate requests for deferment to class 2-C or 3-C of all essential farm workers and operators not already so classified and initiate appeal from local rulings where justified," said Robert B. Taylor, state USDA war board chairman.

"Deferment requests will be based on individual 1943 sign-ups where eight to 16 war units of essential foods will be produced, a war unit being one cow or equivalent in other livestock and crops."

State and county war boards were designated as coordinating units in alleviating seasonal and year-around farm labor shortages through recruitment, mobilization and placement of local and imported workers.

PORTLAND, March 11 (AP)—Horses hooves clattered and resounded between buildings when Eng Hay, John Day Chinese, last visited Portland in 1900. He came back today, noting many changes.

## RABBIT STILL FAIR GAME FOR DOGS

SALEM, March 11 (AP)—Rabbits will still be rabbits and fair sport for any man's dog anywhere in the state, except in Washington county.

There, the rabbits, as well as turkeys, chickens, ducks and geese, will be considered livestock—and woe to the dog who disturbs them.

That was the way the much-debated "rabbit bill" passed the house yesterday. Everybody, including the Washington county

delegation which introduced the bill, was happy.

As originally passed, the bill provided that any dog who chases the rabbits or the other poultry could be shot on sight. The dogs won their point in 35 counties, but they will have to be careful in Washington county.

Members of the house, fearing that collecting dogs that chase rabbits would be too much of a job for county dog catchers of the state at large, restricted its terms to Washington county and its more ambitious dog catcher.

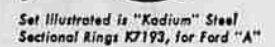

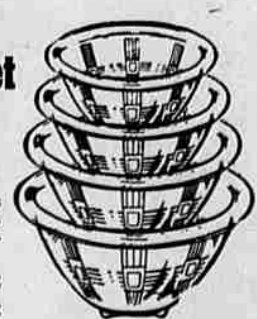
