# **RUBBERS LEAD** MARKET RALLY

By VICTOR EUBANK NEW YORK, March 12 (4P)-Led by rubbers and rails, the stock market today extended Thursday's rally by fractions to two points with a number of favorites recording highest quotations since November, 1940.

Revival of investment demand, brokers said, provided the principal bidding inspiration and purchases generally were on a cash basis. Large blocks of low-priced stocks put volume up sharply in the forenoon but pivotals also were ac-Transfers were in the neighborhood of 2,000,000 shares. Top advances were reduced in most instances by profit taking near the close.

Peaks for 1943 or longer were reached by Goodyear, Good-rich, U. S. Rubber, General Tire, Firestone, Santa Fe, N. Y.
