EVANGELISTIC MEETINGS TO BE HELD HERE

Arrangements have been completed for conducting a series of evangelistic meetings in the former garage on the corner of Main and Eleventh streets, now the Bible auditorium.

Lectures will be conducted in the rear of the building, which has been greatly renovated. The floor is carpeted with shavings, and the rostrum is attractively decorated with flowers. The arch extending over the rostrum has a beautiful motto painted in colors which bespeaks the theme of the lectures. Comfortable benches have been provided, and a large audience is expected.

These lectures will be conducted in association with the Voice of Prophecy radio broadcast, which is operating on more than 200 stations.

Evangelist A. L. Beazley will be the principal speaker, assisted by G. M. MacLafferty and his corps of workers. Evangelist Beazley comes to Klamath Falls highly advertised as a Biblical scholar, and is known throughout Canada and the United States as a noted interpreter of the prophecies of the Bible. In these lectures he will give prominence to world events, and will reveal what the veils of old have disclosed regarding the climax of this present world conflict, and many other events which will soon take place.

His subject for Sunday night, March 14, will be "The Downfall of Turkey and the Climax of the War." Tuesday night, "Hitler and the Coming Man of Destiny." Wednesday night, "The Reign of Peace for 1000 Years." Thursday night, "Signs of Christ's Second Coming." Friday night, "The New Heavens and the New Earth."

All subjects will be vividly illustrated with stereopticon and slides. Special music will be rendered each night, both vocal and instrumental, and be under the direction of G. M. MacLafferty, with Mrs. MacLafferty, Dorothy Beazley, daughter of the evangelist, will be the pianist.

LUTHERAN CHURCH GETS NEW PASTOR

The inaugural service of Rev. Victor A. Schulze, formerly of Sunnyside, Wash., who has taken over the pastorate of Zion Lutheran church on High street, will be held next Sunday beginning at 11 o'clock. Pastor Schulze was installed last Sunday as pastor of Zion congregation by his predecessor, the Rev. C. F. Nitz, who has recently accepted the position as acting dean of the Lutheran Preparatory school in Portland. The theme for Pastor Schulze's inaugural sermon will be, "What a Christian Congregation and Pastor May Expect of Each Other." The new pastor of Zion is a graduate of Concordia seminary, St. Louis, Mo., the home of the Lutheran hour, where he was granted a bachelor of divinity degree.

Prior to his acceptance of Zion Lutheran's call, Pastor Schulze had six years of experience in ministerial work. He has served the Lutheran church one year as a vicar at Lodi, Calif., two years as pastor at Oroville, Wash., and three years as pastor at Sunnyside, Wash. He is also at present serving as assistant secretary of the Oregon-Washington district of the Evangelical Lutheran church.

In taking over his new charge at Zion Lutheran, Pastor Schulze says, "From the outset I wish to assure my parishioners and any interested persons of this community, that I will preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, for which the Lutheran church, since the days of the reformation, has stood.
