PORTLAND, Ore., March 13 (AP) — Albert C. O'Neal, 78, whose engineering exploits led to storybook fame, died here yesterday.

The Iron Trail, in which a resourceful engineer, Murray O'Neal, was the leading character. Dr. George Whiting also drew on O'Neal's career for "Grit, Grief and Gold."
