## Redmond Pilot Safe After Strafing Gun, Rescuing Buddy Under Enemy Fire

By NOLAND NORGAARD WITH U. S. FORCES ON THE TUNISIAN FRONT, March 15 (Delayed AP)—A United States Airacobra (P-39) pilot took off under a barrage of enemy gun fire, strafed and silenced a gun position, then landed in the No-Man's land of the Tunisian hills in an effort to rescue a fellow pilot.

Both pilots, Lieutenant Paul E. Christ of Redmond, Ore., and Flying Officer Martin D. Frane of Chicago, Ill., took to the bush when Christie was unable to get off again, hid until nightfall,

then walked to a British tank outfit.

The fliers had been on patrol and bad weather forced them to land within range of German guns, which opened fire immediately. Both tried to take off to escape, but Frane's plane was hit and disabled.

Christie got his plane in the air, knocked out the gun position and landed again. His landing gear failed, however, and both men were compelled to race aloft through bullets from enemy outposts and seek shelter in the cactus.

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## STRIKE CLOSES FRISCO BREWERIES

SAN FRANCISCO, March 16 (AP)—A strike of some 2000 brewery workers over a closed shop contract has closed down five major San Francisco breweries and dammed the flow of beer to the city's taverns.

One brewery spokesman said a marked shortage of beer would be felt in this area within a week if the strike should continue.

The strike was called yesterday when the employers refused to sign a contract setting up a closed shop for beer truck drivers of the Brewery Workers' union, independent. The brewery said they would not sign because they wished to remain neutral in a long-standing dispute between this union and the AFL Teamster's union.

## FUEL NEWS

War has changed our concept of values to the point that many of our former interests are now of no interest at all and some of the things we used to take for granted are now items of keenest interest. Most of the necessities like food, clothing, fuel and shelter are in this latter class. To assist our friends in solving their individual problems we present a summary of the fuel situation in Klamath Falls today.

**OIL**  
 Fuel oil is now rationed on a basis of about 75 per cent of normal needs for home heating. If you cannot maintain satisfactory temperature with the reduction, you are still permitted to use auxiliary heat from un-rationed fuels. Coal, Wood and Sawdust are still available and are not rationed.

**COAL**  
 Coal is not rationed and is still plentiful in Klamath Falls. We do not know of any place else on the Pacific Coast where the supply was adequate this winter. Government and railroad requirements are so heavy that an acute shortage is expected in coal next winter. Fifty per cent of next year's coal should be purchased and stored before June 1, 1943. The other 50 per cent may be obtained from mine shipments and dealer stocks.

**BRIQUETS**  
 This popular fuel is now restricted by W.P.B. to

outside use in communities outside of Portland. One car has been received for this purpose and is now available to eligible buyers.

**WOOD**  
 Blocks are still short, delivery is delayed 30 days. Folks wishing to store blocks for next winter should buy one or two loads a month during the spring and summer so that their purchases will not disturb the orderly flow of blocks to the buyers with current needs.

**SLABS**  
 Slabs are plentiful today, both green and dry. Delivery is prompt and quantity is unrestricted. Folks who wish to haul their own wood may now haul from the Ackley Sawmill on Klamath Avenue. The slabs are 18 inches long and assorted sizes for both cookstoves and heaters.

**LIMB AND BODY**  
 These forest fuels are scarce and will be scarcer because of the large amount of labor required. If you cannot find limb or body wood, buy slabs.

**WOOD RATIONING**  
 Authorized for the Northwest but will only be imposed in areas where a shortage exists. We believe that if the wood users of this area conscientiously store their winter requirements in the early Spring and Summer as the wood dealers are doing, there will be no necessity for rationing here.
