STOCKS BOG WITH PROFIT TAKING JOLT

By VICTOR EUBANK NEW YORK, March 17 (AP) Stocks bogged down today and many prominent shares gave up part of recent gains as the market settled under the weight of a fitful profit chasing. Sales were around 1,400,000 shares.

Under water most of the day were, among others, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, American Telephone, General Motors, Chrysler, Goodyear, U. S. Rubber, Harvester, Boeing, Douglas, Western Union, Anaconda, Westinghouse, Dupont, Allied Chemical, Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, Great Northern Preferred, New York Central and Texas Co.

Resistant at times were Pepsi Cola, American Airlines, United Airlines, New Haven and Seaboard Airline.

Rail bonds were irregularly lower.

New Wool Purchase Plan Considered by Commodity Credit

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP) A wool purchasing plan now under consideration by the Commodity Credit corporation applies to the clip of the current year only. Sen. John Thomas (R-Ida.) said yesterday after a conference of CCC officials, representatives of the wool trade and of growers.

Wool growers, at state and national meetings, have recommended that the government take over the nations clip for the duration of the war and two years thereafter.

CHICAGO WHEAT

CHICAGO, March 17 (AP) — Possibility of early house action to prohibit deductions of benefit payments in setting price ceilings, combined with reports of damage to the winter wheat crop in some areas, produced a strong grain market today.

Wheat advanced more than a cent at one time, influenced by a lack of offerings and strength at other markets, and rye jumped about 2 cents. Covering by previous short sellers helped the advance in rye. Oats were firm.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c higher, May \$1.45 1/2, July \$1.46 1/2. Corn was unchanged at ceilings, May \$1.01, oats advanced 1/2c and rye gained 1-1/2c.
