OPA EXPLAINS LOCAL SHOE RATIONING

Mrs. Alto F. Pruitt, district shoe rationing representative for the OPA, explained rationing to Klamath shoe dealers in a meeting at the OPA offices last night.

She listed the following instructions to shoe dealers in regard to shoe ration banking: Shoe ration banking begins on April 5. On that day dealers go to their bank and get their material.

Inventory is to be taken as of the night of April 10. Inventory must be turned in by the night of April 17.

If the shoe ration banking account is not opened by the night of April 17, business in ration type shoes cannot be continued until account is opened.
