Pictured on this page are fifteen pretties from Klamath Union high school. From this group will be chosen one girl, the "Sweetheart of Klamath High."

This is the story. Klamath Knights, KUHS organization, is sponsoring a war bond and stamp drive under the direction of Martin Butz, president. For each stamp or bond sold, votes at the rate of one for each cent, are given to the purchaser's favorite candidate. The initial drive ends March 31, and the highest candidate from each of the four groups, senior, junior, sophomore, freshman, goes into the finals. Each girl retains the total number of votes.

For 23 days the campaign will continue and on that day in April the "Sweetheart of Klamath High" will be crowned. But the most exciting moment for the winner comes when she is sent to Portland to be a member of a christening party at the Kaiser shipyards. The "Sweetheart" will also be feted by the state war bond committee in Portland. The trip is financed by organized labor in Klamath county.

Goal of Klamath high students is the purchase of a \$20,000 gun for the sub-chaser.
