

SCHOOL BOARD NAMES PERCY WELLS BUYER

Klamath school boards in joint session Monday night appointed Percy Wells, the board clerk, as purchasing agent for the blended systems here. The districts have now adopted machine accounting with the purchasing coordinated in charge of Wells.

Nelson Reed was named chairman of a committee to student improvements in the athletic field at the high school.

It was reported that a hot water return line to the pump on Modoc field is now being completed. The field well is used in heating the gymnasium and vocational training rooms.

At the next meeting, Wilson Wiley, board attorney, will review legislation adopted this year affecting education.

It was also announced that on Monday, March 29, classes will be dismissed from the local schools at 3 p. m. so that teachers may attend a "radio convention" over the Mutual radio network. State Superintendent Rex Putnam will discuss legislation as a feature on the hour's program, which will replace regular teachers' institutes this year.

ALLIED SUBMARINES HIT JAP SHIPPING

CHUNGKING, March 23 (AP)—Allied submarines inflicted great losses on Japanese shipping on the sea lanes between Shanghai and Nagasaki, Chinese dispatches said today. The ships sunk were reported to include the Nagasaki Maru of 5,268 registered tons, the Yokohama Maru of 6,143 registered tons and the Kobe Maru.

(No Kobe Maru is listed in Lloyd's shipping register.) The reports said that, with shipping between Nagasaki and Shanghai so seriously endangered, the Japanese now preferred the longer route between Japan and China by way of Korea which entailed only a short, comparatively safe sea journey, although it necessitated a long haul by rail.

(The Chinese dispatches did not give the source of information about the Japanese shipping losses on the changed shipping routes.)

Rationing Calendar

RATION BOOK NO. 2
March 29—Rationing of meat, butter, cheese, canned fish and edible oils in effect. (Red stamps in book No. 2 to be used.)

March 31—Blue stamps A, B and C in book No. 2 (canned, dried or frozen fruits and vegetables) expire at midnight.

CANNED MEATS, FISH
March 29—Sales freeze period ends, rationing begins.

SUGAR
May 31—Stamp No. 12, good for five pounds, expires at midnight.

COFFEE
April 24—Stamp No. 26, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

March 21—Stamp No. 25, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
May 21—No. 5 stamps, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

March 21—No. 4 stamps, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

TIRES
March 31—Cars with "A" books must have tires inspected before this date. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle "D" books.

SHOES
June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

PROCESSED FOODS
April 1-10—All retailers of processed foods register with local War Price and Rationing Board, 434 Main, office hours daily 10:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m.; Saturday 10:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

FATS
March 22-29—Butter, shortening, etc., frozen.
March 29—Rationing of fats starts.

NAZI WAR MACHINE HAS NO WEAKNESS

LONDON, March 23 (AP)—The German war machine shows no sign of critical weaknesses despite the batterings of the past four months, authoritative British circles reported Monday.

These sources, which may not be further identified, said they had made an over-all survey of the German military, industrial and moral situation as it had been affected by defeats in Russia and the unrelenting British and American bombing.

Each separate line of investigation, they said, led to these same conclusions:

- 1. Germany shows no signs of cracking.
- 2. Nazi positions apparently are strong enough to preclude any likelihood of an early end of the war.
- 3. Hitler's machine will function right up until the day, perhaps even the very hour, when it goes dead.

This information, it was indicated, probably was the basis for Prime Minister Winston Churchill's statement that the war might last until 1945.

WASHINGTON, March 23 (AP)—Eastern motorists went on reduced gasoline rations Monday. For holders of "A" rations, the reduction amounted to one-half. Holders of "B" and "C" rations also lose one-half of their basic "A" rations but their supplemental rations are not affected.

INCREASE NOTED IN PEDESTRIAN DEATHS

An increase in the ratio of pedestrian fatalities to total traffic deaths in Oregon so far this year led Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., to urge drivers and pedestrians to drive and walk more carefully to avoid accidents of this type.

"In normal times, pedestrian accidents accounted for about one-third of the total traffic deaths reported in this state," Farrell pointed out. "During the first two months of 1943, however, pedestrian accidents accounted for 55 per cent of the traffic deaths for that period."

"Virtually all pedestrian type accidents could be prevented through the exercise of common sense, ordinary care and caution on the part of drivers and pedestrians."

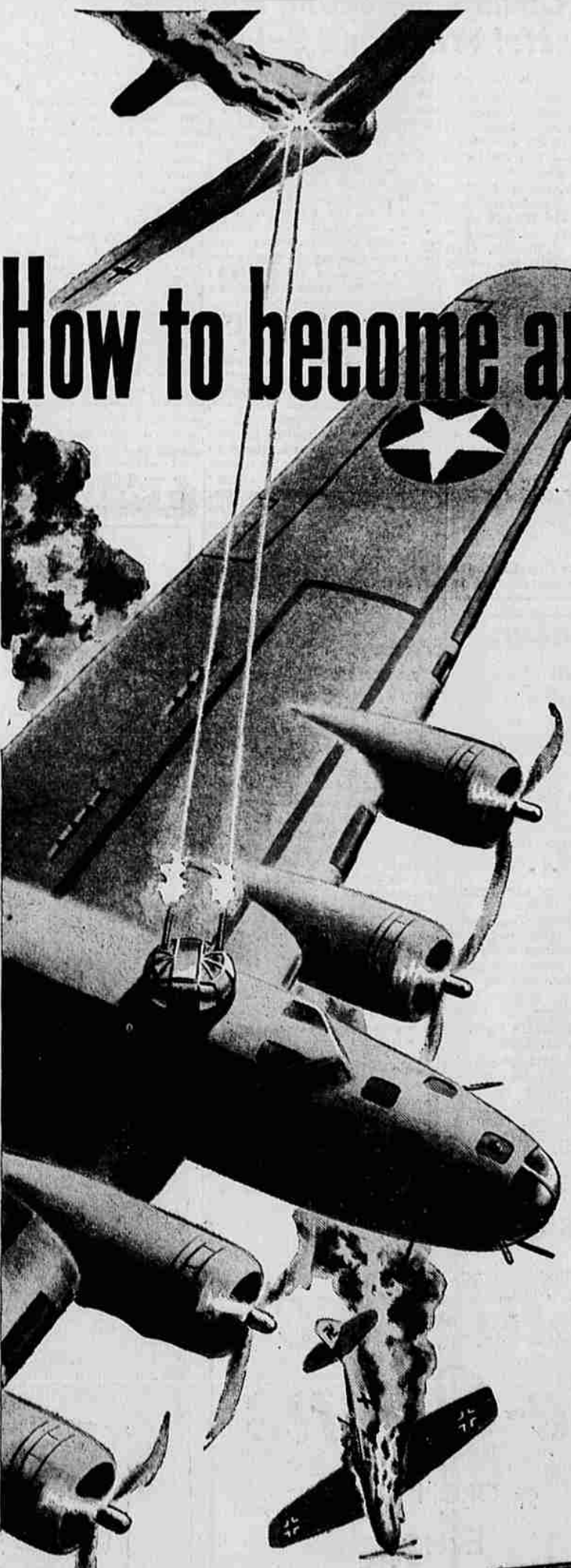

You may then volunteer for induction through your local Selective Service Board. After induction you will be assigned for preparatory training, upon completion of which you will receive

your appointment as an Aviation Cadet and have an opportunity to become a Bombar-dier, Navigator or Pilot—one of the "Three Musketeers of the Air"!

- 2. If you have already been called for induction, you cannot apply direct for Aviation Cadet training. But upon induction, if you are assigned to the Army, you have the same opportunity open to every soldier, 18 to 26 years old, inclusive, to apply for Aviation Cadet training after you are in the ranks.

If you are 17 but not yet 18

- 3. If you are 17 but not yet 18, you can go now to your Aviation Cadet Examining Board and volunteer for enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve. If you pass the physical and mental examinations and are accepted, after you become 18 you will be assigned for preparatory training, leading to appointment as an Aviation Cadet. Enlistment under the age of 18 requires parents' or guardians' consent.
