**Henry too Tough for Tribuani**

**Armstrong Gains Ten Round Decision over Al Tribuani Before 12,633**

PHILADELPHIA, March 23 (AP)—Henry Armstrong proved last night he is the man of "1000 punches" in whipping tough Al Tribuani, of Wilmington, Del., before a howling crowd of 12,633 paid customers at Convention hall.

Making his first eastern appearance on a comeback trail that now leads to New York's Madison Square garden, "Hammerin' Henry" threw close to 100 punches a round in gaining an unanimous 10-round decision over the game Tribuani.

Although his flailing arms had the Wilmington youth on the verge of a knockout in the third, fifth and tenth, Armstrong, a 5 to 1 favorite, admitted afterwards that it was a "tough fight."

"I was fighting a superman because he's ambitious and a win over me would have put him right up there," Henry said. "It was tough."

Armstrong, who will start training Thursday for his April 2 bout with Beau Jack in New York, said his eyes and hands were okay and that he thinks he may be able to get down to the lightweight limit of 135 pounds. As for going 15 rounds, he added, "I didn't feel good until the 10th round."
