## INDUSTRIALS LEAD MARKET ON RECOVERY

**NEW YORK, March 23 (AP)—**Industrial stocks led the market on another recovery push today with favorites rising fractions to a point or more to a new tops for the year or longer.

Liveliness of issues selling under \$10 lifted volume for the full proceedings to around 1,300,000 shares. The direction was upward at the start and subsequent bidding centered on steels, rubbers and chemicals. Rails did well for a time but eventually lost momentum. Final prices were under the best in most cases.

Conspicuous at peak levels for 1943 were Goodyear, U. S. Rubber, Lee Tire, Willys-Overland common and preferred, Virginia-Carolina Chemical, American Agriculture Chemical, Sunshine Mining, Spiegel Inc., Dome Mines, McIntyre Porcupine and Deere. Ahead most of the time were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Du Pont, Morris & Essex, Allied Chemical, Santa Fe and Southern Pacific.

Railway bonds got back on the forward track.
