

MURPHY NAMED HEAD OF TULELAKE ROTARY

Commission Notes General Compliance With 48-Hour Week

WASHINGTON, March 23 (P)—War manpower commission officials said today their reports point, on the whole, to "general compliance" with the 48-hour week to be put into effect April 1 in 32 designated areas of labor shortage.

The same holds true, they said, on a national scale with respect to the lumbering and non-ferrous metal mining industries, the only two designated for the 48-hour week so far on a country-wide basis.

Keefer, recipient of the Navy Cross for distinguished service, who was injured in the sinking of the Yorktown, will arrive here in the near future for a visit with his brother, Jerome Keefer, principal of the high school and his family. Word of presentation of the award came via radio, just a few hours before Jerome Keefer received a telegram telling of the prospective visit.

Lieutenant Commander Keefer, at the time of Pearl Harbor, was in command of the USS minesweeper, Cuckatoo, and his brother had not learned of his transfer until the radio message. The lieutenant is now in San Francisco.

LOS ANGELES, March 26 (P) The district attorney's office has

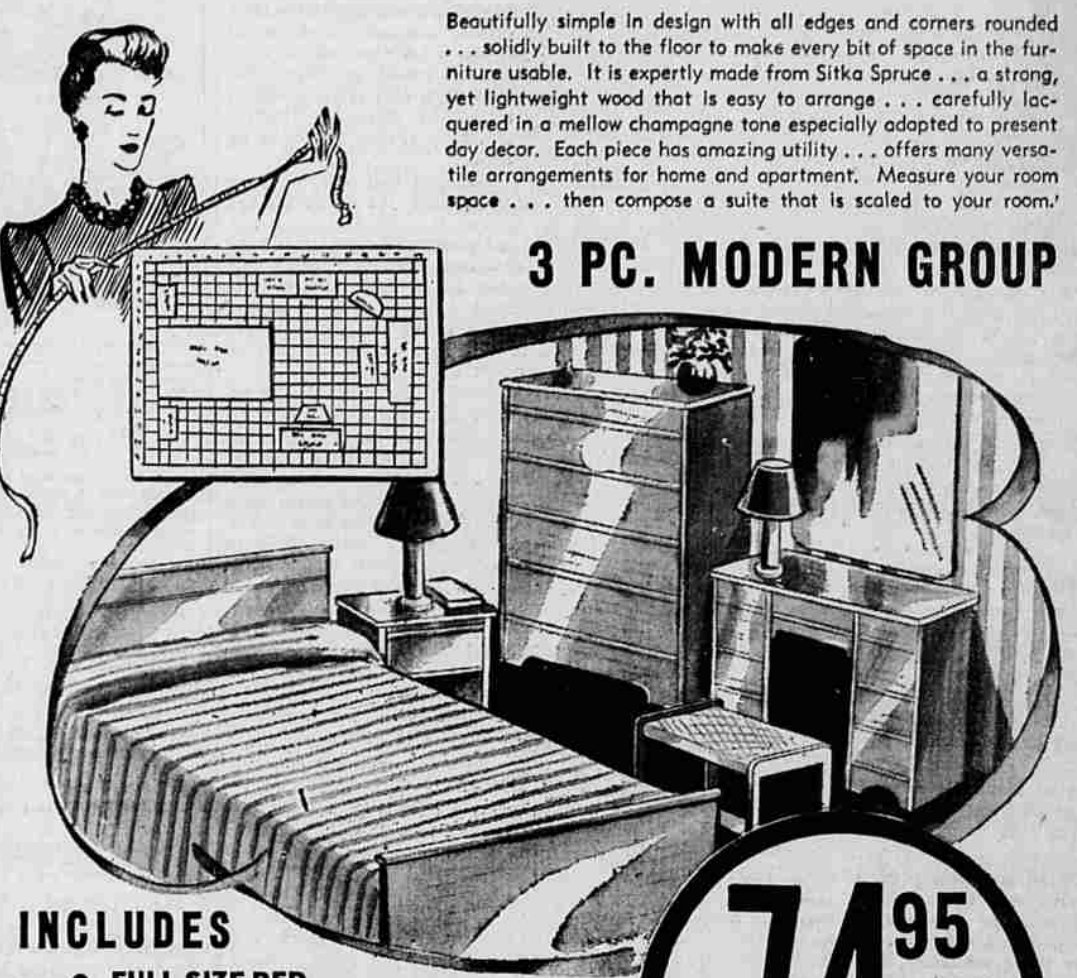
concluded its investigation of a chest wound suffered by Earl Winfield Spencer, first husband of Wallis Warfield, now the Duchess of Windsor.
