Church Women Report on State Council at Luncheon

Reports of the state conference of the Oregon State Council of Church Women will be presented Tuesday, March 30, at 2:30 p. m. in the Methodist church parlors at Tenth and High streets. The board of directors is asked to meet at 1:30 p. m.

Delegates attending from Klamath Falls included Mrs. John C. Yadon, president of the local council, affiliated with the state and national United Council of Church Women, and Miss Hazel Morrison, program chairman of the local group.

A part of the report is given here:

The second annual meeting of the Oregon State Council of Church Women was held in Eugene February 25 and 26. Forty delegates, made up of Oregon Protestant women representing 15 different denominations, met the first evening to hear Mrs. J. R. McCormick, president of Portland's presbytery, define the purpose of the council. Mrs. McCormick outlined the group's general aims which are toward fellowship, re-orientation, Christian unity and world brotherhood.

"The council," she stated, "is a clearing house for experiments and ideas, a place where we can pool our resources and energies, and a place to increase our Christian awareness, understanding and vision."

Mrs. A. F. Holmer, state president, introduced Helen Topping, secretary to Kagawa in Japan for many years, Mrs. Carl L. Krouse, managing editor of radios, "The Voice of American Women on the Air," and Mrs. Johnson, employed by national defense housing on the Pacific coast, now working in Portland.

The meeting then adjourned to the First Christian church to hear Dr. E. Stanley Jones speak on "India, the Enigma."

The meeting convened Friday at 8:30 a. m. Mrs. George Bend-

Ecuador Missionary Speaks At First Baptist Church

Mrs. Reuben E. Larson, representative of station HCJB "The Voice of the Andes," and missionary to Ecuador for 19 years, will speak at the First Baptist church, Eighth and Washington streets, tonight at 7:45 p. m.

The radio station, HCJB, broadcasts 13 hours daily from Quito, Ecuador, and transmits some of the largest gospel programs of the world. Programs are broadcast in nine languages over four stations. The Rev. Reuben E. Larson and Clarence W. Jones are co-directors of the station.

The personnel connected with these broadcasts are known widely as "the aerial ambassadors of good will" to the Americas and the world. Rev. and

Mrs. Larson are now on furlough in the states and expect to return to South America in June.

The Larsons pioneered in missionary work for five years in the jungles near the head of the Amazon, prior to the beginning of their vast radio mission. Since coming to the states they have been interviewed by many of the leading newspaper and radio men of the nation. Mrs. Larson recently spoke on the "Haven of Rest" program.

"Aerial Ambassadors" will be Mrs. Larson's subject for the service tonight. Special music will be provided by the church. The public is invited to attend.
