Board Recommends Abolition of Old Rail Freight Rates

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Abolition of long standing regional differentials in freight rates and establishment of a uniform national rate structure were recommended today by a board of investigation and research created by the 1940 transportation act.

In a report to the president and congress, two of the three board members declared that uniformity was necessary "to provide equal opportunity for the economic development of all parts of the country "without artificial rate handicaps or preferences."
