

# BLOCK LEADER PLAN GETTING UNDER WAY

Citizens service corps block leader plan, which was organized two weeks ago to assist citizens in solving any war problems that might arise, was rapidly getting under way last week.

The block leader council met for the second time since its organization Friday, April 2, with Earl Reynolds, coordinator of the local defense council, and Lynn Hoycroft, director of U. S. citizens service corps.

Mrs. Winnifred Gillen and J. R. McCambridge advised the council on organization procedure gained from their experience in the neighborhood plan which is organized and working very successfully in most of the rural districts.

Mrs. Jean Puckett, chairman of the block leader council said that by the end of this week she hoped that the council would be fully organized and ready for work. Another meeting will be held Friday noon of this week at the chamber of commerce. All area leaders are asked to attend.

The block system is a plan of organization to assure total coverage of all households for civilian war services. This plan has been in operation in most of the counties of Oregon for some time, and in Klamath Falls and suburban area the plan will be set up according to precincts.

Purpose of the block plan is to secure community understanding and support of all programs and activities designed by the civilian defense to help in the war effort. To summarize briefly, it is:

1. To carry forward civilian war activity quickly and effectively.
2. To get vital war information into every home rapidly and accurately.
3. To collect information which may be needed for community war planning and to bring back to the homes answers to questions which have been raised.
4. To promote a spirit of cooperation in neighborhood enterprises, such as block discussion meetings, rallies, car-sharing plans, the sharing of scarce mechanical and household equipment, and any other activity of the community's war services.

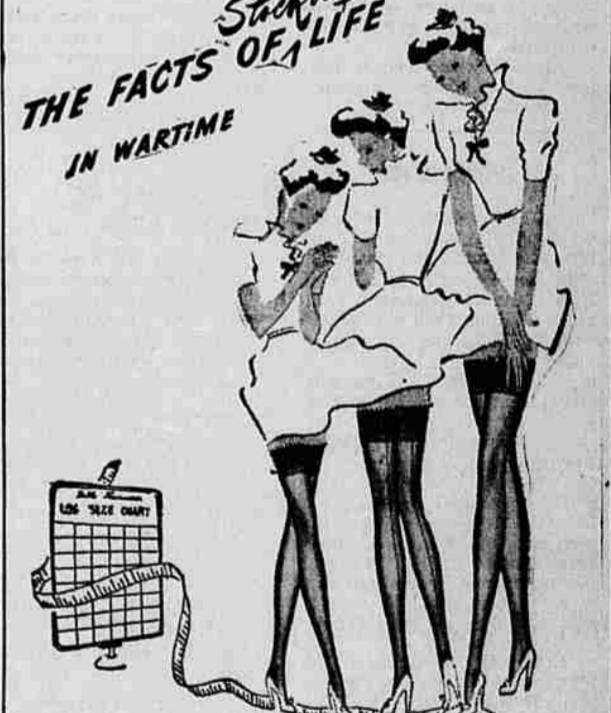
