A featured exhibition of the International Arts and Crafts show to be given by women of St. Paul's Episcopal church Tuesday, April thirteenth, will be paintings and art objects loaned by the Rev. Frederick C. Wissenbach of this city.

The rector of St. Paul's is a member of a family which numbers many well known painters within its circle. Mr. Wissenbach's career started early in life when he studied in Paris and Munich, exhibiting in both cities and in Portland as well.
