SACRED HEART TEACHER DIES AFTER ILLNESS

Sister Mary Alacoque (Catherine Rose Dyer), for the past two years a teacher in the Sacred Heart academy high school, died Saturday at 5 p. m. following a one week's illness. A solemn high requiem mass was said at Sacred Heart church at 9 o'clock Monday morning and the remains sent to Pendleton at noon for interment in that city.

Sister Mary Alacoque was born January 30, 1879, in Ironton, Ohio, and was 64 years at the time of her passing. She had spent 38 years of her life in Oregon, entering the convent at Pendleton on May 9, 1907. She was a member of the order, Sisters of St. Francis.

Two sisters, Ellen G. Dyer and Mrs. Mary Dyer Dewey, both of Pendleton, survive. Sister Mary Alacoque had taught at the Pendleton academy for many years prior to coming here.

MRS. CARL COFER DIES IN PORTLAND

Word of the death of her sister, Mrs. Carl Cofer, 58, was received Sunday evening by Mrs. Leslie Rogers, 851 Pacific Terrace. Mrs. Cofer is a former Klamath Falls resident, making her home here from 1907 to 1925, when the family moved to Yakima, Wash., and later to Portland. Mrs. Cofer's death followed a lengthy illness at her home in Portland, 2041 SE 43rd avenue.

Mrs. Cofer was born Dorothee Margreiter, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Margreiter of the Rogue river valley. She is survived by her husband and one son, Lt. Howard C. Cofer, stationed on the east coast. He and his wife were expected to arrive by plane in Portland sometime late Monday. Other survivors include four sisters and three brothers. Mr. and Mrs. Rogers, accompanied by the latter's sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Buckley of Rogue River, will leave Tuesday morning to attend funeral services for Mrs. Cofer.

WILSHIRE REFINERS ACQUIRE 'OIL CITY'

The Wilshire Oil company, the oldest and largest independent refiners on the west coast, has purchased the Dean Miller "Oil City" plant, trucks and gasoline distributing facilities, it was announced by officials of the Wilshire company today. Cash consideration was not made known.

Distribution here will be a company operation, according to K. Roepke, northern division manager for the company, which will operate stations at Main and Conger, 6th and Market, and 2988 South 6th. J. R. Blatch will distribute the company's products at Merrill. Ross Glikerson, formerly associated with Oil City, will be district manager here.

Opening dates for the company owned stations will be announced later this week, according to Roepke.

Then the bewildered Guadalupe managed in broken English: "Now do I get my gasoline?"



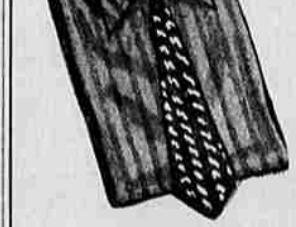
