ZIM BALDWIN, PIONEER STAGE OWNER, DIES

Zim Baldwin, pioneer Klamath and Lake county garage and stage operator, passed away April 12 in Martinez, Calif. according to word received here from his brother, Will, who is in San Francisco.

The son of one-time County Judge George T. Baldwin, Zim Baldwin was one of the colorful figures in the early days in Klamath Falls and Lakeview, and he had a prominent part in the introduction of the automobile into this area.

He was born in Linkville, later Klamath Falls, on January 27, 1887.

In the spring of 1910, he brought the late J. A. Gordon to southern Oregon, and Baldwin and Gordon together introduced the Buick automobile in Klamath and Lake counties. They held the agency for many years, and in 1914 Mr. Baldwin moved to Lakeview where he managed their Lakeview garage.

Mr. Gordon remained here, handling the Klamath end of their operations. They operated auto stages from Klamath to

Lakeview over the rough pioneer roads, and then established stages from Lakeview to Paisley, Plush and Adel. In the winter and spring, the auto stages were exchanged for horse-drawn vehicles.

After selling the Klamath Falls garage, Mr. Gordon went into banking here, but he retained an interest with Mr. Baldwin in the Lakeview garage so long as he lived. In later years, Mr. Baldwin gave up the Buick agency at Lakeview, selling only Fords.

Mr. Baldwin was still active in Lakeview business and civic affairs until a few years ago, and he was one of the founders and charter members of the Order of the Antelope.

Funeral services were held from the Richmond funeral parlors April 14, with cremation at Oakland.
