You can admire such cheerfulness in the face of what he considers the inevitable, but, no high school girl ever dreamed of marrying a bald-headed man. (And fortunately, most matches are made before neglect uncovers that shining dome.)

The point is, girls, we've given up expecting our men to do anything about it themselves, so it's time YOU took a hand.

A RECEDING hairline will respond to massage and a home routine of brushing and applications of individualized pomades and lotions. The Ogilvie Method Shop, operated in New York for men exclusively, recommends a lotion for each individual condition of the scalp—dry, oily or devitalized—one for removing loose dandruff, and a rich pomade to help keep the hairline.
