HOUSE OKAYS PRESIDENT'S AUTHORITY

WASHINGTON, April 21 (P) The house today passed the sen-ste-approved bill extending for two years the president's author ity over a \$2,000,000,000 stabili zation fund, but added an amend-ment which its author said would prevent use of the money in the proposed joint \$5,000,000,000 in ternational banking fund.


The measure extends the pres ident's authority over the \$2,-000,800,000 stabilization fund but withdraws his power to de-value the dollar.

The house on a voice vote first approved the amendment offered by Representative Reed (R-III.) to prevent use of the fund in the proposed international stabilization fund and then quickly passed the measure on a voice vote, sending it for adjustment of the senate and house versions to a conference committee.

The coinage committee insert ed Reed's amendment and the house approved it within a mat

ter of minutes. In so specifying, the commit-tee said it had in mind possible post-war international stabilization efforts, perhaps including establishment of an international bank into which the stabiliza-tion fund might go, whereby di-rect control of it by the presi-ted might be last


No effort was made by the committee in its action to in-clude in the bill extension beyond June 30 of the president's authority to devalue the dollar. This provision was eliminated from the senate bill.


