TEN LAKEVIEW TEACHERS GIVE RESIGNATIONS

LAKEVIEW—Ten teachers in the Lakeview public schools have placed their resignations with the school board effective at the close of the present school term. Eight of these 10 on the teaching staff have plans which, if they materialize, will take them into other lines of work outside of the teaching field. This appears to be in line with conditions throughout the United States, and presents a serious problem.

Resignations placed with the board are as follows:
High School—Mrs. Marie Hughes, social science and chemistry; Miss Jane Reith, home economics; Miss Barbara Ketchum, librarian, high school girls' physical education; Miss Margaret C. Rodman, commercial; Mrs. Russell Bean, English.
Grade School—Paul Goddard, principal central school; Miss Jean Wall, social science in 7th and 8th grades; Miss Letha Coulter, science and mathematics in 7th and 8th grades; Mrs. Kay Greame, language and arts in 7th and 8th grades; Mrs. Dorothy Peterson, fifth grade.
Due to the increased enrollment for the 1943-44 school year, the school board has authorized Supt. C. C. Caldwell to increase the grade school staff by two teachers. One teacher is to be added to the present central school faculty, and the other in the second grade. At present there are three sections of the first grade, and the estimated first grade enrollment next fall is 83.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 26 (AP)—The Henry Kaiser-AFL labor hearing, now approximately 6400 pages long, entered its 44th day before a National Labor Relations board trial examiner today.

The AFL, which added to the voluminous testimony last week, announced a number of officials from the 17 arraigned unions named in the NLRB complaint are yet to be called.

The managing committee of the Oregon Mutual Life Insurance Co., Portland, has allotted \$15,000 of its one million-dollar subscription to the second war loan to Lake county, according to word received by the second war loan drive committee.

The value of the new Lakeview airport was brought home to citizens Thursday when a twin-motored army bomber came down safely after developing motor trouble above the town. The bomber was headed north, carrying a crew of four, when the motor trouble developed. Their map showed the small airport at Hot Springs, but did not contain any information on the new field built last year and not completed.

"There is not going to be any question about Lake county making its quota of \$630,000 in the second war loan campaign," C. F. Snider, second war loan co-chairman, with Ray Harlan, told the Rotary club yesterday. To date, total sales to resident individuals, firms and corporations of Lake county totaled approximately \$330,000. To this amount will be added the allocation of bank and other investments for the county.

Peanuts for Loggers...
