

WASH MACHINE PRICES TO BE FROZEN BY OPA

The Klamath Falls district office of OPA announced today that ceiling prices in dollars and cents would be placed upon all sales of used washing machines whether by dealers, auctioneers or individuals. This was felt to be necessary to eliminate an inflationary trend in prices which have risen in many parts of the country to the point where a used machine was selling for more than a new machine. This regulation will be effective May 3, 1945.

Ceiling prices have been established at March, 1942, levels for guaranteed machines and at October, 1941, levels for those sold "as is" and are based not on the model and year of manufacture, but on the features and specifications of the particular machine which automatically place it in a stated class. A tag must be placed on every machine offered for sale, giving the classification of the machine, the guarantee, if any, and the maximum price. Ceiling prices will range from \$6.67 to \$147.50.

If a guarantee is given the purchaser, the machine must fulfill certain requirements set by the regulation, and if sold without a guarantee it must be in working condition when delivered.

The regulation also sets a flat ceiling of \$4.50 for the first month and \$3.50 for each month thereafter as the rates that can be charged for the rental of used washing machines regardless of the type of machine being rented.

It is expected that copies of the regulation will soon be available for distribution and the local office of OPA will be glad to answer questions and to discuss the matter with anyone interested.

TITUS ARRAIGNED FOR BLY SHOOTING

W. E. Titus, charged with shooting his wife, Erma, at Bly, on February 15 after a quarrel, was arraigned in justice court Monday morning. Through his attorney, J. C. O'Neill, Titus asked for statutory time. He will appear before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg on April 28 at 10 a. m. to enter his plea.

Apparently near recovery from three shotgun wounds found on his body February 15, Titus needed no help in walking through the court room. He was released from Klamath Valley hospital Friday, April 23.

RATION BLUES

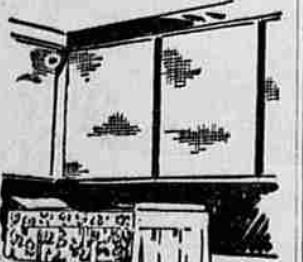
GRAND ISLAND, Neb., (AP)—A disgruntled rancher, arrested by a highway patrolman for intoxication, had a ready explanation:

KLAMATH MEN SEND CATTLE TO ANGUS SALE

MALIN—Two Klamath county Aberdeen-Angus cattle herds will be represented at the Pacific coast Aberdeen-Angus sale and show to be held Sunday and Monday, May 2 and 3, at Galt, 20 miles south of Sacramento.

The sale sponsored by the American Aberdeen-Angus Breeders' association with the cooperation of western Angus breeders will draw entries from Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Illinois and California. Local herds to be represented are owned by Chet V. Barton, Poe Valley, and L. A. and Gerald D. West, Henley and Malin. Cattle from these herds are already widely recognized both locally and elsewhere on the west coast. Barton and Gerald West leave Friday for the Sacramento county fairgrounds where the event is to be held. West will enter three animals, including a cow with January bull calf and an 18 months old bull. Barton will enter at least three animals and it is reported, that the Cheyne ranch of Henley will also exhibit.

The show is the first all-Aberdeen-Angus to be held on the west coast. Thirty six bulls and 80 cows are listed.
