

CLOSING DATE SET FOR CITY SCHOOL SYSTEM

The seven city schools and Klamath Union high school will close for summer vacation on Friday, May 31, and will convene for the 1948-49 school year on Monday, August 30, it was announced following a meeting of the joint school boards Monday night.

Superintendent Arnold L. Grapp stated that the early fall opening had been arranged in order to make possible the release of older school children for the fall harvest requirements.

The following people were named to full time assignments on the city school staff: Lillian Redkey, physical education, on leave of absence at the University of Oregon at the present time; Doris Fredrick, Pluma Erdmann, Ora Reading, Anna B. Fisher and Esther Deller.

Reports were heard from the cafeteria and landscaping committees. It was learned that landscaping of the Monclair entrance of the high school had been completed.

Wilson Wiley, school board attorney, explained the new legislation affecting school finance which was passed at the last legislature.

At the next board session, the budget committees of the two school boards will be named by the individual board members. Each member is entitled to one selection.

OPA EXPECTED TO AMEND SPUD RULE

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—Within a week or 10 days, says Senator McNary (R-Ore.), the office of price administration may be expected to announce an amendment to its potato regulations providing for carload lot distribution.

In the meantime, growers whose markets are pressing for deliveries and who do not find the shipping allowance sufficient, may sell on an f.o.b. basis, he said.

President Lacks Authority to Halt Kaiser Hearing

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27 (AP)—President Roosevelt found he lacked authority to halt the national labor relations board hearing of unfair labor practices against Kaiser shipyards, John P. Frey, head of the AFL metal trades department, asserted.

The claim was made in a speech to 202 delegates to a Pacific coast conference of metal trades councils last week. The session was closed to the press but a transcript of the proceedings was disclosed today.

Frozen Fish Price Ceiling Changes Written by OPA

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—Several changes were written by the office of price administration today into the price ceiling order on frozen fish and seafood.

One revision makes the regulation apply only to continental United States. The amendment perpetuates the price differential which always has existed between fish cost in Alaska and the same species of fish caught along the Pacific northwest coast. Halibut and salmon are the principal species involved.

Ruthless Looting by Nazis Of Conquered Nations Told

WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—German looting of occupied Europe was pictured by the board of economic warfare today as surpassing in "magnitude and ruthlessness" all previous conquests of history.

The board estimated Germany had plundered \$36,000,000,000 by the end of 1941 and the rate since then is accelerating into "tens of billions of dollars per year." It added:

"Not only has wealth, accumulated over centuries, been carried back to Germany, but the industries, natural resources, and labor power of the occupied countries are under absolute German domination."

Its reports, the board said, show that armaments and other military equipment have been taken from all the vanquished armies of Europe.

"Thousands of machines have been dismantled and moved to Germany, with laboratory and scientific equipment from the greatest institutes in Europe," the board reported. "Horses, cattle, sheep, pigs and fats have been confiscated, public galleries and private collections stripped of art objects, and office furniture, park benches, and garden tools taken."

Describing Poland as the outstanding example of confiscation of public property, the board estimated the loot there at \$2,900,000,000.

Military equipment from Austria and Czechoslovakia was traded to southeastern European countries for foodstuffs and raw materials, the report said, but was recovered later when Germany invaded those countries.

SALEM, April 27 (AP)—Governor Earl Snell will return to his office tomorrow after a 10-day rest, part of the time having been spent fishing on the Siuslaw river.

The governor is expected to announce several new appointments to major state offices within the next few days.

April 30—Red stamps A, B, C, D expire at midnight.

May 30—Stamp No. 23, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

May 21—No. 5 stamps, in "A" book, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

SHOES
June 15—Stamp No. 17, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

TIRES
May 31—"C" book holders must have tires inspected by this date with at least 45 days elapsing since last inspection.

RETAILERS AND WHOLESALERS

REDUCTION ESTIMATED ON INCOME TAXES

SALEM, April 27 (AP)—Oregon income taxpayers will get at least a 50 per cent reduction on taxes on this year's income, which are payable next year, State Tax Commissioner Earl L. Fisher estimated today.

Fisher based his prediction on collections this year, which are far higher than any previous year.

The commission has collected \$12,100,000 in personal and corporation income taxes, compared with \$8,200,000 on the same date a year ago. Fisher predicted that total collections for the year would be between \$18,000,000 and \$21,000,000, compared with \$13,800,000 for all of last year.

The 1943 legislature's formula for next year's income tax reduction is based on collections this year and next year's estimated collections.

There have been 237,000 returns filed, compared with 157,000 last year. April 15 was the deadline for filing returns.

Fisher said he could not say definitely how much this year's collections would be. About 50,000 taxpayers made partial payments, and these returns have not been analyzed. Also, there will be many refunds made to men in the armed services.

MELISSA M'MULLEN DIES IN MICHIGAN

Melissa McMullen, 74, a resident of Oregon since 1913, died April 19 in Scottville, Mich., relatives learned here. Mrs. McMullen, long time resident of Klamath county, had been ill for the past two years, and one year ago left for Michigan to visit relatives whom she had not seen for 30 years.

Mrs. McMullen is survived by six children. Mrs. Elmer Ware, a daughter, lives in this city. Five sons, three sisters, and 17 grandchildren, and many friends in this community, mourn her passing.

Scott Distributes School Tax to Oregon Counties

SALEM, April 27 (AP)—State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott distributed \$895,778 to Oregon counties today in lieu of the two-mill elementary school tax for the first half of this year.

The two-mill tax, which is levied within counties and spent within the counties, was wiped out by big income tax receipts.

Amounts distributed to counties include \$41,548 to Klamath.

SALEM, April 27 (AP)—The state highway commission announced today it would open bids in Portland May 12 on seven jobs costing a total of \$140,000.
