

PRESIDENT'S COAL STAND TONICS STOCKS

NEW YORK, April 29 (AP)—

The stock market today found a tonic in the president's strong stand on the coal controversy and leading issues advances fractions to a point or so, a number to new highs for the year or longer.

A little profit cashing slowed the pace after noon and most climbers were under their best levels near the close. Transfers exceeded 1,000,000 shares. Motors, rails and steels were in front of the revival.

Among favorites posting top marks for 1943 were Studebaker, Willys-Overland, three Alleghany preferences, American Telephone, International Telephone, Dow Chemical, United Air Lines, Standard Oil (NJ) and Pennsylvania Coal. Given a lift were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Railway, Southern Pacific, Pittsburgh Coal, U. S. Rubber, Texas Co. and Douglas Aircraft.

Reorganization rail bonds continued to sprint.

BOSTON WOOL
BOSTON, April 29 (AP-USA)—The Boston wool market was a little more active today due to a request for bids on 27,000,000 pairs of socks. Inquiries were made on fine woolen wools. Purchasing of fleece wools in the country was reported as very quiet. Deliveries were made in good volume of previously purchased Montevideo wools.

FARM INCOME RECORD SEEN FOR OREGON

Another farm income record may be marked up in Oregon in 1943, if the physical volume of production is as great as in 1942, according to information compiled by the Oregon agricultural extension service from official data on farm price levels and market demands. The record Oregon cash farm income to date was set in 1942 at more than 220 million dollars.

According to government estimates, Oregon's cash income from farm marketings exceeded 207 million dollars in 1942, not including all of the income derived from the sale of crops and animal products, as several items like some of the forage and cover crop seeds, fiber flax, and farm-raised fur are not included. The addition of these items would bring the figure up to more than 220 million dollars, approximately double the average from 1935 to 1939, the five years before World War II.

This increase in Oregon farm income, 37 per cent over 1941, is practically the same as the average rate for the United States as a whole. Farm production was high in 1942, but most of the boost in farm income over the 1935-1939 average is attributable to higher prices for farm products. For example, in Oregon at mid-March, the general level of farm prices had reached 198 per cent of the 1935-1939 average.

The general average of farm price levels in Oregon at mid-March was approximately 42 per cent higher than a year previous. In the country as a whole farm prices have tended to advance moderately since mid-February, reflecting strong demand for farm products.

In January this year the government index of industrial production had reached 200 per cent

Grain Alcohol Plant Proposed For Columbia Area

SPOKANE, Wash., April 29 (AP)—A grain alcohol plant to use more than 7,000,000 bushels of soft wheat and barley annually has been "proposed for construction on the Columbia river, somewhere between Pasco and The Dalles, Ore.," the Chronicle said yesterday.

Without releasing the source of the information, the article said the construction work would be done by J. A. Terteling and Sons, Idaho contractors, and that the plant would cost an estimated \$1,800,000.

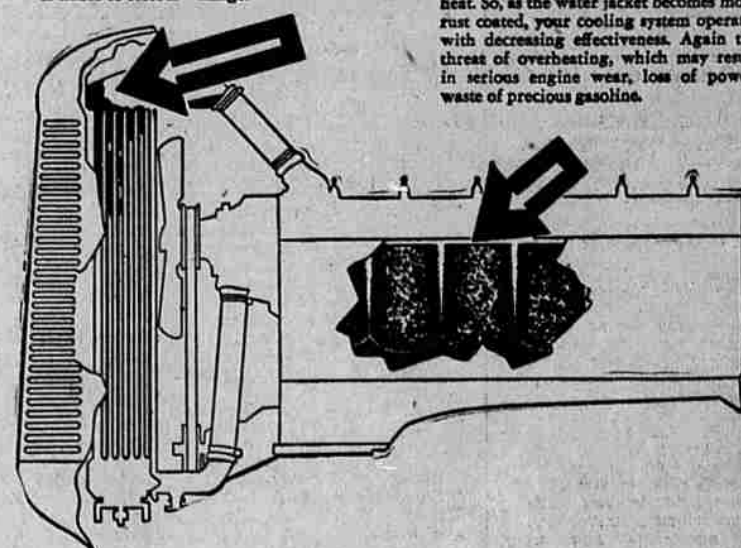
