

FAMILY TOLD CHAS. HITSON ACTION DEATH

Formal notification of the death of their son, Pvt. Charles A. Hitson, was received this week by Mr. and Mrs. Hayden E. Hitson of Bonanza. The family had previously been advised by telegram but no details given by the war department.

Young Hitson, former Herald and News carrier boy, died as the result of enemy action in the North Atlantic on February 3. A portion of the letter from Major General J. A. Ulio, is given here:

"Your son was a passenger on a ship which was attacked shortly after midnight by an enemy submarine and sunk without warning. After the vessel was struck every effort was made to effect the rescue of those who were aboard. Such efforts were continued long beyond the period of time that human life could survive the elements in the area.

"Following due and careful consideration of all evidence and circumstances surrounding the sinking of the ship on which your son was a passenger, an official report of his death has been made. The war department has entered upon its records that your son lost his life in action on February 3, 1943.

"My deepest sympathy is extended to you in your bereavement."

Red Cross Notes

Turkey Interned American Fliers To Be Released

ANKARA, Turkey, April 30 (P)—All American airmen who were interned after forced landings in Turkey will be set at liberty within the next few days, according to official information today.

It was understood that all British, Russian and axis flyers presently interned in Turkey also will be freed simultaneously under an arrangement worked out by the Turkish foreign office with the belligerent nations.

Some Americans have been in Turkey since June 12, 1942, when they were forced down during the first all-American raid over Europe, that on Rumanian oil objectives. The others were occupants of a plane which landed February 16 after a flight into the Balkans.

Protection of Crops From Wildlife Topic of Circular

How to reduce crop damage by wildlife, and particularly pheasants, is described by Arthur S. Einarson, leader of the Oregon Cooperative Wildlife Research unit, in a new circular, No. 148, just issued by the Oregon State college experiment station.

Einarson points out that, while the protection of crops and victory gardens is unusually important in this war year, so has the importance of the wildlife meat supply been increased for the same reason. The present pheasant "crop" in Oregon would amount to three million pounds of meat if "harvested," he shows.

From actual tests made of crop damage by pheasants, Einarson recommends, where possible, keeping particularly attractive crops such as corn from 10 to 20 feet away from game bird cover. This also applies to protection from ground squirrels. The circular also describes a method of treating seed with a repellent which has proved valuable in

instances of pheasant damage. Einarson comes to the defense of the pheasants to a certain extent by showing that a considerable amount of damage blamed on them is often caused by squirrels or crows. He shows how to detect the difference between the two.

He also points out that actual analysis of pheasants' stomachs show that while they do some crop damage, they partially make up for it in the large number of insect pests, such as wire worms and 12-spotted cucumber beetles, which they include in their diet.

An examination of 20 plantings from which crop damage complaints had been received by the research unit showed that the distances of damage from cover range from four to 20 feet. On the basis of this evidence, a planting of a border strip about 20 feet in width to a later maturing crop on those farms where a choice is possible may be found useful in reducing losses, Einarson points out.

HOLLYWOOD, April 30 (P)—Daphne Silva, whose warbling won her a seven-year film contract which ultimately may bring her \$750 a week, is frozen in her position as a \$25-a-week waitress by the war manpower commission's job change restrictions, it was revealed today while Republic studio executives, her present employer and the local commission head cogitated her problem.

She got caught in the freeze by retaining her present job while waiting to be called by the studio.

Bert Harnish, local manpower chief, said, "maybe we can defrost her on the grounds that her skill is not being utilized to the utmost."

CAFE OWNERS REMINDED OF PRICE FREEZE

Proprietors of eating and drinking establishments are reminded by OPA officials that the restaurant regulation freezing prices go into effect on May 1. Prices are frozen to the level of the highest charge during the seven-day base period of April 4, 1943 to April 10, 1943. The filing of menus or price lists for that period must be done with the war price and rationing board by that deadline date, May 1.

Operations under the ceiling price regulation will be closely checked, district OPA officials reported today.

The regulation covers boarding houses, restaurants, taverns, soda fountains, hotels, schools, private clubs, and other establishments of the same class.

After the final date for filing

menus and price lists, regional OPA offices will start checking to make sure that every purveyor of meals has submitted the requested data.
