

COUNCIL EYES COMMITTEE'S BOND REPORT

Recommendations will be presented to the city council in session tonight, Monday, by members of the bond committee following a lengthy and thorough study of city property secured through foreclosure.

Chairman of the committee, W. O. Smith, and members of his group, made the following statement:

"In order to prevent the unnecessary accumulation of taxes, interest and penalties, all delinquent assessments should be foreclosed as early a date as possible. For instance, if there are many delinquencies more than three years old, foreclosure proceedings should begin on these at once. When it is finished, proceedings should be started on next year's delinquencies and so on until there only remain uncollected assessments which are delinquent one year or less.

"As a general policy we would recommend that all delinquent property in which the city has an equity, other than taxes, should be taken over and held by the city, for the benefit of all the taxpayers of the city."

The recommendation, in its entirety, will be read before the council.

Champoeg Observes 100th Anniversary of Oregon

CHAMPOEG, May 3 (AP)—The 100th anniversary of the provisional government in Oregon was observed here yesterday in ceremonies attended by an estimated crowd of 3000.

A few pioneers who entered the territory before Oregon achieved statehood in 1859 and many descendants of pioneers came to the site where early American and British settlers formed the first government May 2, 1843.

Dr. Howard R. Driggs, New York, president of the American Pioneer Trails association and principal speaker, lauded the early settlers of the Oregon country. Robert S. Farrell, secretary of state; Leslie M. Scott,

state treasurer; Charles A. Sprague, former governor, and Walter Meacham, executive secretary of the Oregon Trail Centennial commission, also were on the program.

The sons and daughters of Oregon pioneers sponsored the program as one of the events in the centennial observance. Others are scheduled in Oregon cities later.

Driggs also spoke in Portland ceremonies in which the liberty ship Robert Newell was launched. The vessel, the 177th from the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation, was named after the pioneer who led the first wagon train into the Willamette valley.
