## CITY TREASURY SWELLS WITH FINES, BAILS

Bails and fines collected by the police judge during the month of April totaled \$1579.75, according to a report submitted to the city council Monday night by Chief of Police Earl Heuvel. Councilmen considered this an excellent addition to the city treasury.

A total of 266 arrests were made in April, bringing the figure to 814 for the year. There was one case of aggravated assault, four of burglary, two cases involving thefts of more than \$50, and one under \$50.
