

# SCHOOLS HOLD THREE DAY TIN CAN CAMPAIGN

A three-day campaign will be held in the schools here next week to collect every possible prepared tin can for salvage before schools close for the summer months. Days of the contest are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, May 10, 11 and 12.

The local effort will be part of a statewide tin can collection contest, it was announced by the local tin can salvage committee and school authorities. The Portland baseball club is cooperating in the project.

## Salmon Fishing Slumps After Big Opening Catches

ASTORIA, Ore., May 5 (AP)—Columbia river salmon fishing slumped today after bumper opening season catches.

The 30-hour period between the start of the commercial season last Friday and the weekend cessation brought catches hovering near record proportions at Mayger, Ore., where boats averaged an estimated 1500 pounds. One delivered 3600 pounds.

One local packing firm said the average boat loads for the opening period ran around 800 pounds.

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
