Oregon State was idle yesterday but vaulted into the lead in the northern division baseball race as Washington State spoiled the opening of the University of Oregon's northern road trip by trouncing the erstwhile front-runners 14 to 5.

Oregon State will play third place Washington today at Seattle and Oregon and Washington State will resume hostilities at Pullman. The Beavers will close their road trip against the Huskies again Friday, and Oregon will move on to Moscow for a pair Friday and Saturday against Idaho.

WSC started the fireworks in the fourth inning yesterday and kept on blasting at the offerings of Johnny Bubalo and Harold Saltzman, Oregon hurlers, for a total of 16 hits. Kramer gave up 10 hits for the winners, who threatened only once, with a four-run rally in the eighth. Bergman, WSC shortstop, was the day's top hitter, getting four for five.

Simple Track Meet - Now Track Mess

LOS ANGELES, May 6 (P)—That trackfest at the coliseum Saturday is going to be a triple-dual meet—or something equally complicated.

It started out as the annual California-USC dual, which the Trojans have won since 1926. And now:

Arnold Eddy, USC graduate manager, announced yesterday that six teams (and several individuals) are entered: the Bears, Bruins, Trojans, Whittier, Pepperdine and San Diego State.

The last four were to have competed with UCLA Saturday morning. At a later date the Bruins were to meet California at Berkeley.

By pouring the whole business together, the Bruins are saved a trip north, and three duals result: Trojans against Bears, UCLA against Bears, and Bruins against the combined efforts of Pepperdine, Whittier and San Diego State.

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Oregon Prep Trackfest Operates on War Basis

Field Shaved Of Second Placers; Bocchi's Discus Throw Breaks Record

EUGENE, May 6 (P)—Oregon's streamlined, wartime championship high school track and field meet will be held here Friday on Hayward field where 108 athletes from every section of the state will vie in the 14 standard events.

Under a war-time set-up the usual two-day competition will be cut to a single day, and the field has been shaved in half by the elimination of the second-place winners from the eighth district meets held last weekend.

Preliminaries in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the high and low hurdles will be held at 10 a. m., with the meet proper opening at 1:30 p. m. Colonel Bill Hayward, veteran University of Oregon track coach, will be director of the meet which will be conducted in true Olympic style. Although the first five place winners will receive ribbons instead of the usual medals, the awards will be presented by the university's junior weekend queen and her court.

New state records are problematical in view of the restricted training under adverse weather conditions this spring and the fact that this annual classic is being held 10 days or two weeks earlier than usual.

Unusual, however, will be the appearance of seven defending champions who won titles at Corvallis last year, namely, Neidermeyer, Medford pole-vaulter; Bocchi, Klamath Falls high jumper; Dipple, Medford 100-yard champion; Heacock, Seaside javelin thrower; Krause, Cottage Grove quarter-miler; Dyson, Ontario's low-hurdles champion, and Burgher, Ontario's 220-yard titleholder.

Only Krause, however, was able to register the best mark in the state during district competition, and many of the champions were far under their winning performances of 1942.

The only records that appear in great danger are the discus and high hurdles. Bocchi of the Klamath Pelicans qualified for the state championships with a toss of 139 feet 7 inches in the discus, a foot and two inches better than the state mark held jointly by Reginato of Klamath Falls and Heidenrich of Mac-Hi. Turner of Seaside ran the high in 15.5 in district competition, one-tenth of a second over the new state mark made by Magruder of Mac-Hi at Corvallis last year.

Condition of the track is expected to be good, and other good performances are expected to be made during the afternoon. The University of Oregon will be host for the meet, but only housing will be furnished the visitors in view of present food rationing.

A meeting of the OHSAA will be held here early Friday morning, and the state prep coaches will hold their semi-annual meeting at noon Friday.

Portlanders, Seattle to Try Again

Weather Postpones First Of Home Game Series; Net Result—Portland Gains

Portland and Seattle will try again today to show the home folks the 1943 editions of their Pacific Coast league baseball teams.

The opening game of the first at-home series for either team was postponed yesterday because of the weather.

Net result was that Portland gained slightly on the second place San Diego Padres who lost, 6 to 1, to the Hollywood Stars. This same victory by the Stars, on the other hand, pushed Seattle down into seventh place, with Hollywood moving up to sixth out of a cellar tie.

Sacramento gained undisputed tenancy in the basement by losing 2 to 1 to Oakland, the Solons second straight loss of the series. None of the runs were earned in a tight pitching duel in which Henry Phippen of the Oaks gave up only five hits and Byerly of Sacramento six.

In taking the second in two days from San Diego, Hollywood broke a 1-1 deadlock in the sixth by pushing across four runs on four hits.

Weekday ball games at Portland will start at 2:30 p. m. instead of 4 p. m., beginning today, business managers said yesterday in announcing the schedule revision that will see yesterday's postponed contest made up in a twin bill on the Angels next trip to Portland.

Beau Jack Gets Bid to Fight Mexican Star

LOS ANGELES, May 6 (P)—Beau Jack, lightweight boxing champion by New York standards, has been offered \$30,000 to \$35,000 for a title bout here with Mexico's stellar Juan Zurita.

The \$30,000 bid was made by Matchmaker Charley McDonald, but McDonald said Jack's manager, Chick Wergeles, advised him the Beau wants a \$50,000 guarantee.

This word brought from George Paranasus, Zurita's plot, a compromise inducement of \$35,000, but, Paranasus said, that is the limit. He did not name the angel behind the \$35,000 offer.
