# MAN, WIFE GET SENTENCE FOR BAD CHECKS

Prison sentences meted out by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg Thursday brought disaster to a man-and-wife bad check team which was allegedly responsible for about 20 bad checks in Klamath Falls, Medford and northern California points.

District Attorney L. Orth Sismore said that Harold Fisher and Audrey Marie Fisher, man and wife, worked together in cashing the checks on banks in which they had no account. Fisher was given three years in prison, and Mrs. Fisher was given two years and a parole, by Circuit Judge Vandenberg.

The district attorney said the checks were usually written by Mrs. Fisher, signing Fisher's name. They would then go into a business house together, make a small purchase, and submit the check.

In some instances, according to Sismore, Mrs. Fisher would return the next day, explain they had not gotten money yet from

bonds in California, and would pay a dollar on account to "keep the heat off."

# Capt. Clark Gable Enjoys First Raid On Flying Fortress

LONDON, May 7 (AP)—Captain Clark Gable went on his first raid in the Flying Fortress attack of May 4 on Antwerp and "enjoyed it and learned a lot," the eighth air force today quoted him as saying.

Capt. Gable, former film star, flew as an observer on the Fortress "Eightball Second," which went through the raid without encountering enemy planes and sustained only two small flack holes.

The plane was piloted by Capt. William R. Calhoun Jr., of Birmingham, Ala. Gable, who qualified as air gunner before his recent arrival from the United States, did no shooting. The pilot called the trip "uneventful."

# GROWERS TOLD OF FARM HELP POSSIBILITIES

TULELAKE—Tulelake Growers were advised at a meeting Tuesday night of the opportunity to move 300 Mexican laborers to the Tulelake district in the near future from holdings in the southern part of the state controlled by the Spreckles Sugar company, provided living accommodations were provided by local ranchers. The transient labor not at present needed in their present location would be sent here in time for onion weeding about the last of May or the first of June.

lease lands being opened by the bureau of reclamation for potatoes and on other smaller acreages elsewhere.

Chester L. Main, president of the Growers, reported on the recent conference with U. S. Senator Sheridan Downey in San Francisco, attended by Main and Dan Crawford, secretary of the growers at which Downey gave assurance of concentrated efforts toward alleviating the expected labor shortage during the growing season.

Roy D. Adkins, Howard Dayton, Leonard Meshke and George W. Osborne were appointed by Main to seek further information on the transportation problem. The committee is to meet with the war manpower board of Siskiyou county in an effort to get immediate release of trucks frozen in the hands of dealers. Applications for several trucks have already been made, both in Siskiyou and in Modoc counties.

In recognition of the need for a permanent site for a labor camp, the lots across the highway from town, used in other years as a camp ground by trans-

ient help has been offered the growers by the reclamation office of the Klamath project without cost.

In a long distance telephone conversation today, Chester L. Main of the Tulelake Growers' association asked growers to contact him immediately, telling the amount of Mexican labor they can use on their farms. In order to get the men here, work must be promised for 75 per cent. Efforts are being made to acquire the Tulelake CCC camp to house the workers.
