## MOTHERS TO BE HONORED BY BAPTISTS

The mothers of Klamath Falls will be honored at all the services of the day at the Bible Baptist church, located on Ward street at South Sixth.

## LUTHERANS TO RAISE MONEY FOR SERVICES

Realizing the value and importance of Christianity as a "moral-builder" for the men and women serving our country in the armed forces, the members of Zion Lutheran church will, on Sunday, participate in a nationwide effort to raise \$500,000 to keep the Lutheran church with its members who are serving the nation as soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses.

Through its army and navy commission the Evangelical Lutheran church operates a comprehensive program for men and women in the armed forces. Parents and wives, home pastors, the commission office, service and contact key pastors, chaplains, all work together in a co-ordinated program to give men and women under the colors opportunity to hear the Word and partake of the Sacrament, wherever possible.

The government pays the salary of our 160 chaplains. The church, however, must provide them, as well as the 450 service and key pastors, with materials to enable them to carry out their ministry to Lutheran men and women. The commission must supply each man and woman in the armed forces who is a member of the Lutheran church with a service prayer book, directory of key pastors, a Lutheran metal identification tag and other Christian literature. The chaplains must be supplied with communion ware, service manuals, tracts, prayer books and other material.

To each overseas chaplain a \$50 expense fund is made available for the benefit of our Lutheran men and women. Service and parish centers numbering 94 are operated in conjunction with the National Lutheran council. The commission furnishes name and address cards, tracts and folders, and in Memoriam scrolls for presentation to the bereaved to every pastor of the church. Many expressions of appreciation have been received from those who have been benefited by this service of the church.
