In patriotic and historical matters, the chapter made a good record the past year. One paper was submitted to the state and national historical records; 131 naturalized citizens received flags and manuals, and a welcoming program was presented when they received their final papers; 50 genealogical records were compiled for the national genealogical records; six radio programs on conservation were presented; 487 inches of publicity in The Herald and News told of the work of Eulalona chapter during the past year. In addition, two girl homemaker pins will be awarded at graduation time, and one medal of honor will be given to a Junior American Citizen club member, and four girl pilgrimage certificates will be awarded.

The incoming officers were installed by Mrs. Thomas Hampton, installing officer for the chapter, with the regular ritualistic ceremony. The Hunt home was artistically decorated for the meeting, with flowers from the home gardens.

Mrs. Goeller will name her committees during the summer months, and will outline the program for the coming chapter year, beginning in September. She has asked Mrs. Wilbur A. Jones to serve as chairman of press relations for the year.
