Oregon State, with but two more northern division Coast conference baseball games to play, took a tighter grip on the league leadership yesterday by defeating third-place Washington 6 to 3 behind the tight pitching of Don Cecil.

Oregon meanwhile recovered from two disastrous whippings by Washington State and kept Idaho tightly locked in the conference cellar with a 23 to 1 shellacking. These two teams play again today at Moscow after which Oregon moves to Seattle for a Monday-Tuesday series with Washington. Oregon and Oregon State will close their conference seasons in a home-and-home series May 15 and May 17.

Although they were outlitt 11 to 5, errors were the Huskies' undoing yesterday. Only two of the Beavers' runs were earned, while all of Washington's came the hard way against flawless OSC fielding.

The Beavers started off with two runs in the first inning on a walk, Catcher Frank Roelandt's double and an error, and led all the way.

Bill Giesberg hit a home run for Washington in the first inning.

Coach George Greene of Idaho shifted his lineup three times, used three pitchers and three pinch hitters but failed to stem the flood of Oregon hits and Idaho errors.

Easy Settlement Of Grid Titles Disputes Eyed

EUGENE, May 8 (AP)—The state high school football championship may be decided this fall without controversy.

The board of control of the Oregon High School Activities association voted yesterday to recommend to the general assembly in December a plan to settle titles for Class A, Class B and six-man football teams. The State High School Coaches association approved the plan, then elected Orville Bailey, Marshfield, president; Frank Ramsey, Klamath Falls, secretary, and Marble Cook, Beaverton, vice president.

Bocchi Stars at Track Meet; Medford Crowned

Pearpickers Win State Go for Fourth Time; Klamath Man Breaks Discus Mark

EUGENE, May 8 (AP)—Southern Oregon's domination of state high school sports was complete today with Medford wearing the state track championship for the fourth consecutive year. The strong Pearpickers, however, barely nosed out Seaside. Until the last event, the half-mile relay, Medford trailed, 18 to 16. But the Pearpickers speed quartet toured the 880-yard relay course in 1:33.7 minutes to win by 40 yards and boost the team total to 21 points. Seaside did not place in the relay.

That sent the track crown south, following the basketball title, won by Klamath Falls, and the football championship, claimed by Klamath Falls and Marshfield.

In addition the only record performance of the day was by a southern Oregon boy, Jim Bocchi of Klamath Falls, who sent the discus sailing 139 feet. The old mark was 138 feet 5 inches, held jointly by Marion Reginato of Klamath Falls and Ray Heidenrich of Milton-Freewater.

Bocchi also won the high jump to share individual scoring honors with Dick Harlow, Seaside, who won the 100 and 220 dash events.

Team scoring ended like this: Medford 21, Seaside 18, Marshfield 15, Beaverton 13, Klamath Falls 11, Coquille 10, La Grande 9, Vale 8, Eugene, Bend and Hood River 7, Chemawa, Columbia Prep, Woodburn and Scappoose 6, Ontario, Roseburg, Rogue River and Lakeview 5, Molalla 4 1/2, Grants Pass, Harrisburg, Cottage Grove and Willamina 4, Springfield, Corvallis, Hillsboro and Milwaukie 3, Silverton 2, Enterprise 1 1/2, Myrtle Point, Redmond, Central Catholic and Salem 1.

Bocchi in the high jump and Ralph Dyson of Ontario in the low hurdles were the only defending champions who won. Five others were eligible, but Steve Dipple, Medford, ran third in the 100-yard dash; Lee Krause, Cottage Grove, second in the 440; Bob Heacock, Seaside, third in the javelin; Dale Neidermeyer, Medford, failed to qualify for the pole vault in the district meet, and Bill Burther, Ontario, last year's 220-yard dash winner, was scratched because of his mother's illness.

Portland Drops Pair of Pitching Duels; Seattle Blanked by Frisco Seals

Northern teams continued to fare badly yesterday on their home fields against California entrants in the Pacific Coast league.

Portland dropped a pair of pitching battles to Los Angeles, 2 to 1 and 4 to 1, and Seattle was blanked 4-0 by San Francisco in a game that saw Seal Pitcher Bob Joyce fall one blooping single short of a no-hit-no-run performance. Portland's defeat dropped the Beavers into fifth place behind Oakland which defeated Sacramento 5-4 in a 14-inning struggle.

Charley Schanz finally checked the upward surge of the Hollywood Stars, pitching seven-hit ball to give San Diego a 10-4 victory.

Ad Liska of Portland and Red Lynn of Los Angeles tangled in the first game at Portland. Liska fanned 11 Angels and issued but five hits, while Lynn was scattering eight Portland bingles and whiffing five. A single by Charley English in the sixth inning broke a 1-1 deadlock and gave the Angels their winning margin. Ken Raffensberger pitched two-hit ball to win the nightcap.

Only three of the punchless Rainiers got on a base against Joyce. Carnett connected with the single that ruined the no-hitter in the sixth and also drew a walk. The third Seattle runner to reach first did so on an error. Joyce struck out only two. Hal Turpin was on the mound for Seattle. The teams meet again today in a double-header.

The oaks came through in their 14-inning game when Emil Malihoo drew a walk with the bases loaded, forcing in the winning run.
