

# RULING OKAYS 'NO HUNTING' ON DITCHES

TULELAKE—Ownership of drain ditch and lateral banks has been definitely established after a prolonged controversy between owners of farm lands and the Klamath reclamation service. Announcement of the decision in favor of land owners was made at a recent meeting of the Tulelake-Moore Farm center which has sponsored the program for posting the contested areas.

Farmers in the future may post ditches provided signs are uniform and read "Hunting on government rights-of-way prohibited unless permission is granted by adjacent landowners."

Loss of livestock and damage to fences in recent years led to the request for ownership rights. A. E. Ryckman, Dan Crawford and John O'Shea were appointed to order the signs. Expenses of posting must be borne by the landowners.

Joint resolutions issued by Lloyd Lowery, state assemblyman of the third district, were read. Resolution No. 3 asked for a memorial to congress to initiate proper action and legislation to forfeit the U. S. citizenship of any persons having dual citizenship and to prohibit those individuals from becoming a citizen of the U. S.

Joint resolution No. 6 was a petition to amend the U. S. constitution to bar persons of Japanese descent of ownership of leasing property.

The Farm Center voted to endorse the set of resolutions sent here from the Capay Valley Center, Guinda, California.

The center went on record also as favoring a fall closing of Tulelake schools during the peak of the potato harvest next fall. The vote was in answer to a query from Principal George Reiben. It is planned to close for three weeks during October.

SEATTLE, May 11 (AP)—A proposal for 10-hour shifts in shipyards seems doomed here today after conferences of representatives of management and labor with a war production board fact finding committee.

## JUDGE TOOZE HEARS MOTIONS ON FLOOD

Circuit Court Judge Walter L. Tooze of Portland was in Klamath Falls Monday to hear motions and demurrers on the pending Algoma flood cases.

Judge Tooze was appointed by the state supreme court judge to sit on these cases, in which several landholders are plaintiffs and the California Oregon Power company is a principal defendant, along with the Southern Pacific company.

Judge Tooze concluded hearing arguments of attorneys Monday morning.

Plaintiffs in the cases are represented by J. H. Carnahan and Carlyle Yaden, and defense attorneys include Richard Maxwell, Klamath Falls, and Clarence Young of Dey, Hampeon, Nelson and Young of Portland.

## Recess Requested At Kaiser Labor Hearing by AFL

PORTLAND, May 11 (AP)—The Kaiser shipyard labor hearing continued today while Robert N. Denham, national labor relations board trial examiner, sent to Washington an AFL request for a 60-day recess.

The hearing is on CIO charges that the three Henry Kaiser shipyards in this area signed illegal closed shop contracts with the AFL. The AFL asked the recess in order to prepare additional evidence.
