PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR MORE COFFEE

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—Prospects still are bright for an increase in coffee rations, OPA officials said today, but no decision is expected for at least a week.

Recalling Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown's recent statement that an increase was likely, officials said there had been discussions of boosting the present ration of one pound a person for five weeks to one pound for four weeks or one pound a month.

Officials explained that present stocks of coffee on hand are sufficient for a larger ration but that before any action is taken studies are being made to determine future supplies.

Court Martialed Soldiers Fly AWOL

UPLAND, Calif., May 12 (AP)—Two court martialed soldiers, accused by army authorities of escaping from the guardhouse at Minter field, near Bakersfield, Calif., and flying to Pomona, Calif., in an air base training plane are under arrest here, police announced early today.

Police Sgt. R. H. Palmer said he took the pair into custody on a residential street. They were in civilian clothes, which they purchased here yesterday, he said.

Twenty-six other Navajos, despite persuasion, quit the gang. Interpreter Richard Redshirt said the 26 believed the great spirit was displeased and wanted them to return to their reservation.

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—The labor department is studying a proposal to permit 18-year-olds to engage in logging.

Up for review is a year-old ruling that logging is too hazardous an occupation for youths under 19. Senator McNary (R-Ore.) said the action was taken at the request of the Westport, Ore., lumber company, which wants to employ boys 16 to 18 years old during school vacations.

Lewis Returns; No Statement Made

WASHINGTON, May 12 (AP)—President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers returned to his office here today but his press representative said he was not seeing anyone and had nothing to say for the present.

Lewis had promised a statement on the coal mining dispute for 4 p. m. today but suddenly postponed it. His office said it could give no explanation immediately for the change in decision or whether any developments are in prospect.

Pontoon-Riding Soldiers Rescue Victims of Flood

MUSKOGEE, Okla., May 12 (AP)—Pontoon-riding soldiers reported today all refugees had been cleared from the valley of the rampaging Arkansas river, whose record-breaking flood crest surged on toward Fort Smith, Ark.

Col. R. J. McBride of Camp Gruber, whose soldiers dared the sweeping current all night and into the morning to bring out treed bottom dwellers, said his reports indicated all endangered residents had been removed.

Capt. James H. Green, commanding the rescue crews, expressed belief there had been no loss of life beyond the six already reported dead.

Floods have left hundreds homeless and caused heavy crop, livestock and truck garden damage through eastern and southern Oklahoma. The Arkansas river reached a crest of 35 feet, seven inches, here this morning and dropped to 33 feet, eight inches, six hours later.
