Recalling Price Administrator Prentiss M. Brown's recent state-ment that an increase was likely, officials said there had been discussions of boosting the present ration of one pound a person for five weeks to one pound for four weeks or one pound a month.

Officials explained that present stocks of coffee on hand are sufficient for a larger ration but that before any action is taken studies are being made to determine future supplies.


