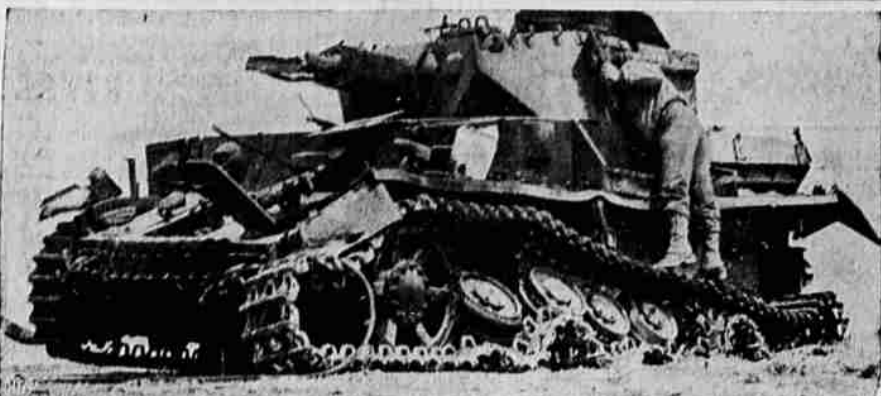

WARM DAYS TOPPLE WEATHER RECORDS

Weather records have been topping in these parts, according to the gentlemen who keeps the books and every month since June, 1942, with the single exception of November, has been warmer than a 37-year average. The past month of April went right along in line. Last November fell below the normal figure by one-tenth of a degree which is close figuring for the weatherman. Mean temperature in April was 49.8 degrees compared to 46.5 degrees, the mean for all years. Maximum temperature was noted on the 11th with 79 degrees, while flowers drooped on the 26th after a chilly 27 degrees recorded that morning. It cannot be said, however, that April was dry. Although it was below normal the first 24 days, June loosed a storm in the last week to run the month's precipitation to an even two inches compared to only .92 inches, the 50-year normal. Clear days number 10, partly cloudy, 14, and cloudy, 6.

Coal Consumers Advised to Order
WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—To "avoid serious risks of grave shortages next winter," Transportation Director Joseph B. Eastman today urged coal consumers to order their supply immediately. The railroads, he said, can transport enough coal to meet prospective demands for next winter only if the fuel is kept moving throughout the year.

Oregon to Observe African Victory

PORTLAND, May 13 (AP) — Oregon will observe "African victory day" next Wednesday by proclamation of Governor Snell. Inviting other states in the celebration of "the redemption of the first continent reclaimed from our enemies," the governor last night issued a proclamation which read in part:

"Britain has rung its church bells and rejoiced throughout the land over the liberation. Russia and China have rejoiced. It is improper for America to leave to its comrades in arms the observance of this first decisive and absolute victory of the second World war."
