Army Still Commissions Men From Civilian Life

Regardless of reports which have gone over the country that the army no longer commissions men from civilian life, the fact is that the army needs and is anxious to get men who are qualified in particular vocations as well as educational backgrounds for commissioning in the army. The matter of men to command troops in combat is one which the army has solved thoroughly through its officer training schools, but officer training schools cannot take care of educating men for all of its needs.

Particularly needed at this time are construction engineers in the matter of light construction, such as cantonment construction, equipment maintenance men who have handled heavy road building equipment, and men who have had outstanding experience in handling crews on the job in road construction and the movement of earth. Officer engineers and architects are not needed in this connection.

The army also looks for nutrition officers, lay hospital administrators, sanitary engineers, bacteriologists, biochemists, telephone and telegraph engineers, radio engineers, graduate electrical engineers with radio experience, men who have had outstanding experience in executive positions with railroad and truck lines, and men who have formerly been commissioned in the army and who now have a working knowledge of trigonometry.

Also needed are men who have had from two to three years or more experience in teaching one or more of the following subjects on the senior high school or college level: mathematics, navigation, maps and charts, photography, mechanical engineering, radio, meteorology or cryptography. College graduation is required for teaching mathematics and electrical and mechanical engineering, but for the other subjects, while it is preferred, it is not absolutely essential, but the man must qualify as an expert in his line.

Most of these men must be between the ages of 35 and 50 years. Men between the ages of 38 and 45 years will be given preference. In the exceptional case of graduate electrical engineers with radio experience, applications will be considered from men from 30 to 35 years of age.

Coupons for 75,000 Gallons of Gas Found on Youths

SEATTLE, May 14 (AP)—Ration coupons for 75,000 gallons of gasoline and 140 food ration books were found on two California youths arrested here last night.

Detective Cap. G. C. Vernon said one was booked as Edward B. Graham Jr., 19, Banning, Calif., and the other, a 15-year-old, was turned over to juvenile authorities.

Vernon said the pair admitted stealing the ration books in their home town before coming north to seek work. Graham, the officer said, had worked in a steel plant near Los Angeles.
