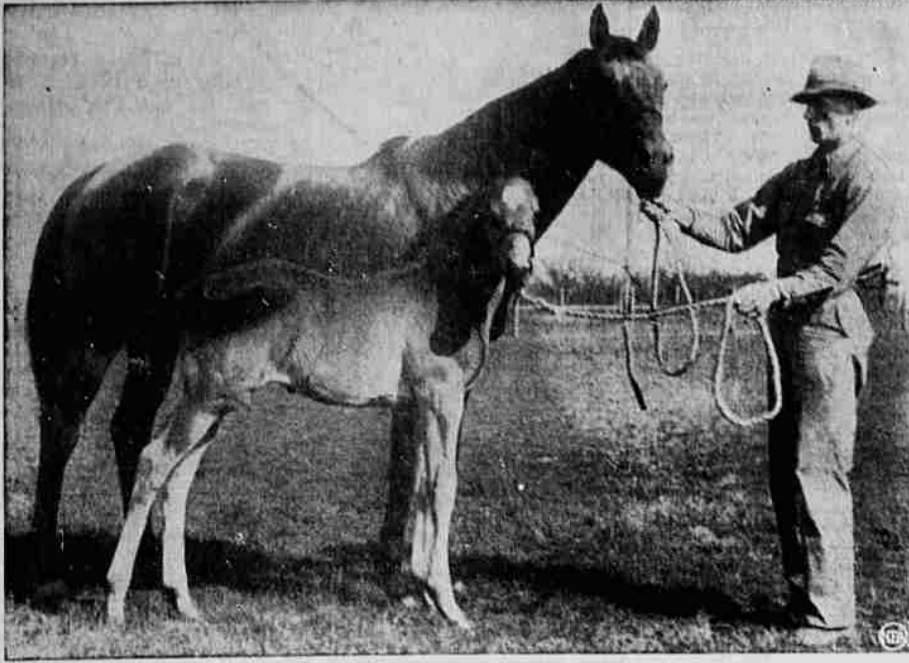


Count Fleet's Kid Brother

The funniest extra curricular contest in the National League are running to keep track of whether Leo Durocher or Frank Frisch of the Pittsburgh Pirates gets put out of the most games this year.

Frisch was a bad boy yesterday and got thrown out of the Pirates' pastime with the Dodgers (Rip) Sewell, and First Baseman Elbie Fletcher. With this central corps gone, it was hardly surprising that Pittsburgh finally was beaten 5-4 in the ninth inning on Joe Medwick's pinch single with the bases loaded.

The other leading development in the senior circuit yesterday was that the Philadelphia Phillies divided a doubleheader with the Cincinnati Reds and moved into the first division.

Old St. Johnson pitched four hit ball in the first game to win 2-1 as Early Naylor hit his third homer. Bert Haas also connected for the circuit for the Reds in the first game and Cincinnati captured the nightcap 3-1.

The St. Louis Cardinals reinforced their third place position by beating the Boston Braves 5-0 on the four-hit shutout hurling of Ernie White. All the Cardinals' runs were scored in the seventh inning.

A pinch home run with two on in the ninth inning by Dick Bartell gave the New York Giants a 7-4 triumph over the Chicago Cubs after Carl Hubbell had failed to annex his 250th victory in his first start of the season. This put the Cubs and Giants in a tie for seventh.

LOS ANGELES, May 14 (AP)—Red Lynn, Los Angeles right-hander is showing the way to pitchers in the Pacific Coast league with a perfect record of six wins and no defeats.

The Angel veteran has fanned 17 batters. Charlie Root, former Chicago Cub star and now managing Hollywood, is in second place with four wins and no defeats, and Jodie Phipps of Los Angeles is third with three wins and no beatings.

Chuck Schanz, San Diego right hander, is the league's leader in strikeouts with 28.

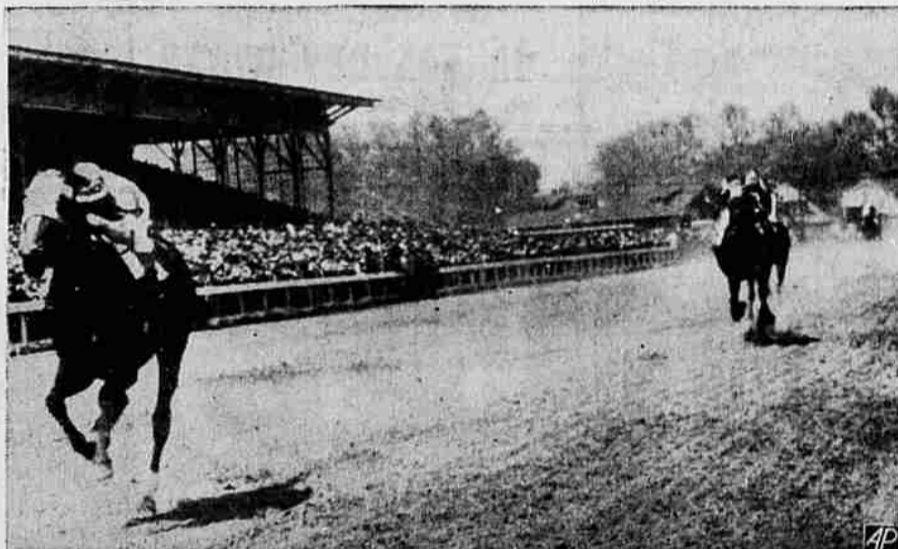

Happy-Go-Lucky Pitcher Dies

ALTOONA, Pa., May 14 (AP)—Perce (Pat) Malone, 40, whose happy-go-lucky career as a pitcher for the Chicago Cubs and New York Yankees ended in a physical breakdown in 1937, died last night of acute pancreatitis.

Malone helped pitch the Cubs to National league pennants in 1929 and 1932, later going to the Yankees for three years. He played in three world series and won 134 games and lost 92 during his 10 years in the major leagues.

Weekend Fishing Prospects

PORLAND, May 14 (AP)—Fishing in Oregon will range from excellent to poor this weekend, the state game commission said today, but many streams were reported improving rapidly.

The weekly bulletin gave these county-by-county reports: Columbia—Conditions right in all trout streams with the Nehalem river particularly favorable.

Washington—Stream conditions ideal but good catches reported on bait only.

Linn—Streams high and fishing only fair.

Benton—Good catches reported from Willamette near Irish Bend and Peoria and from Mary's river near Philomath.

Lane—McKenzie river and other streams only fair. Few nice catches taken from the Willamette near Oakridge.

Curry—Limit catches reported from Flores and Garrison Lakes and Sixes and Elk rivers. Rogue only fair.

Coos—Fishing fair.

Tillamook—Trout fishing best in tidewater. Salmon trolling good in tidewater and bays.

Lincoln—Most streams too high.

Wasco—Limit salmon catches taken at Sehar's bridge. Deschutes improving steadily.

Deschutes—Deschutes yielding good catches south of Bend on bait and spinners. Some limits taken at North Twin lake.

Jackson—Rogue only fair for salmon and trout. Conditions poor in Applegate country.

Josephine—Rogue yielding excellent catches around Grants Pass. Nice catches of cutthroat

trout taken from Illinois and Applegate rivers on flies.

Grant—Streams still high but receding.

Klamath—Most streams high and roily.

Lake—Streams too high except for Drews and Deep creeks Dog lake good.

Malheur—Dry creek best possibility. Other streams too high.

Union—Small catches reported from Wallowa and Minam revers but most streams still high.

Wallowa—Streams vlear but too high for best results.

Unlucky Beavers Drop 11 Games by One Point

Portlanders Lose Second 2-1 Decision To Seals Under Wacky Circumstances

The management of the Portland ball club decided to start the current season off right by calling its Lucky Beavers, but the title boomeranged and today all hands conceded that Portland was about the most unlucky club in the circuit.

How else could 11 losses by a margin of a single run out of 24 games be explained? The latest reverse came yesterday when the Beavers dropped their second 2 to 1 decision to the San Francisco Seals under wacky conditions to say the least.

It was the last of the ninth with the score tied one-all. George Metkovich, Seal outfielder, knocked out a double and Henry Steinbacher stepped up to the plate. Portland's Pitcher Joe Orrell pitched two strikes and no balls when Umpire Bill Moran stepped in to delay the game because of the weather. Twenty-five minutes later the game resumed with Orrell picking up where he left off on Steinbacher. Henry connected on the first offering, Metkovich scored, San Francisco won and Portland's luck was at its dreariest, all in a matter of minutes.

Hammerin' Hank May Slug At White in South If Cal Boxing Elimination Pans

LOS ANGELES, May 14 (AP)—It begins to look as though Los Angeles is going to have the lightweight battle of the summer — Henry (The Hammer) Armstrong against Luther (The Slugger) White.

The California boxing commission plans to go ahead with an elimination tournament involving White, Willie Joyce of Gary, Ind., Juan Zurita, the Mexican champ, John Thomas, ranked fifth by the NBA, and a few others, but when that is all over White probably will be on top and Armstrong will be the logical choice to meet the California-recognized champion.

Fact is, White is coming here tomorrow from his home in Baltimore, and several promoters are anxious to get his signature on a contract calling for a bout with Armstrong, provided the slugger gets over two (and he will) warm-up bouts against Julio Jimenez in Hollywood and someone else to be selected for a San Diego card.

Between now and July, when Armstrong and White are likely to fight at Wrigley Field in a twilight feature, Armstrong has a return engagement with Joyce, who beat him decisively in 10 rounds that one.
