Aircraft Works Hit by American Bombing Mission

LONDON, May 13 (AP)—The heaviest concentration of bombs ever unloaded on a single target by the eighth U. S. air force was poured on the Meaulte Aircraft Works in France yesterday, enveloping the plant in a sea of flame and smoke, it was announced today.

Photographs taken at the height of the raid, made by the largest force of heavy United States bombers ever to raid the continent from British bases, showed the target area almost completely obscured by smoke and flames from bursting bombs, headquarters said.
