DAR Chapter Enjoys Colonial Program While PTA Installs New Officers

LAKEVIEW — The Daughters of the American Revolution met in the Schmink Museum Monday afternoon, May the third. The ritualistic opening exercises and business session were conducted by Regent Lora Conn. Chaplain Thula Rogers conducted the devotional services.

The Lakeview DAR chapter is now a non-profit organization, having received its articles of incorporation from the state of Oregon. Articles grant the chapter the privilege of owning property, and thus places the chapter on a firm and enduring basis. Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Schmink and Mrs. Lora Conn deserve much praise for this accomplishment. Mrs. Janice Alger was appointed attorney-in-fact.

The cultural program consisted of a report on Colonial music, in keeping with Music Week, and a report on Colonial life and costumes. The report on costumes was illustrated by an exhibit of colored pictures and some hand-made Colonial dresses which are 100 years old, being made in 1843. One of the dresses exhibited and which is part of the museum display, was the wedding dress of Mrs. Schmink's mother, Mrs. Foster, who wore this dress in 1843 for her wedding and five years later, in 1848, Mrs. Foster's younger sister wore the same dress on the occasion of her wedding.
