Cal Shears **Huskies of Crew Crown**

By Yearling Promise in Whipping Bears in 2 Mile

OAKLAND, Calif., May 17 (49) The University of Washington crew, shorn of their three-year crown, were homeward bound today with a consolation prize after coming off second best in their annual regatta with the University of California.

While the varsity lost out by seven and a half lengths, the Husky yearlings showed high promise in nipping the Golden Bear shell by a one foot margin over the two-mile distance,

The feature race over three miles was marked by ragged rowing on the part of Coach Al Ulbrickson's inexperienced Huskies. Nearing the two-mile post the stroke, Elliot Loken "caught a crab" and almost lost his oar.

The Californians widened their lead to almost 10 lengths at the 21 mile marker on smooth, powerful strokes of 33 and 32. The Huskies, stroking 31 and 32 most of the distance, spurted near the finish to close the gap.

It was a different story in the freshman race with never more than three-quarters of a length separating the two shells. The Husky Cubs were clocked in 10 minutes 14 seconds while the bear Cubs swept in a tenth of a second later. Racing conditions were poor with rough weather handicapping both shells.
