Local Industries Included In Stabilization Program

Locally-needed industries such as restaurants, laundries and hotels are included along with agricultural and industrial war production activities in the recently announced statewide employment stabilization program of the war manpower commission, according to Jack Almeter, local office manager of the United States employment service for Klamath Falls.

"L. C. Stoll, area war manpower director for Oregon, declared restaurants, laundries and hotels essential to the war effort several months ago in the Portland metropolitan area," Mr. Almeter said, "and in effect, the stabilization program ordered for this and every other Oregon county is merely an extension of the job stabilization program developed by the WMC and administered by the USES in Portland."

Some time the war manpower commission has been promoting voluntary control over the transfer of workers through what is known as employment stabilization plans. The basic purpose of these plans is to see that workers are placed in positions which will fully utilize their skills to the best interest of the war effort.

"The plans just adopted for Klamath county spell out those conditions of transfer which are in the best interest of the war effort. In general, they say specifically that workers cannot transfer from one essential activity to another except with availability certificates issued either by the employer or local USES officials representing the war manpower commission in this county."

"The exception to this rule," Mr. Almeter said, "is that farm workers may transfer from one agricultural activity to another without the need for a clearance slip or a certificate of availability. However, should a worker presently employed in agriculture desire to transfer to another type of war production work, he cannot do so without a clearance slip or a certificate of availability."

The AAA suggests that consideration be given to the lowering of age limits for the granting of driving licenses as a means of easing the shortage of persons qualified to drive private and commercial vehicles.

JUNIOR HIGH GRADUATION ON THURSDAY

Some 229 eighth graders will receive their diplomas from junior high school in commencement exercises to be held at 8 o'clock Thursday night in Klamath Union high school. The interested public is invited to attend.

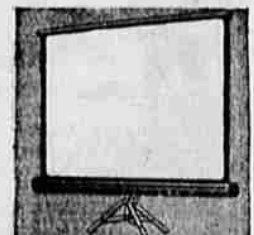

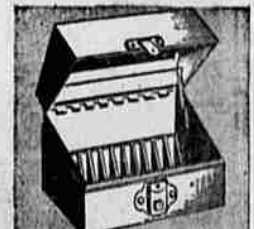

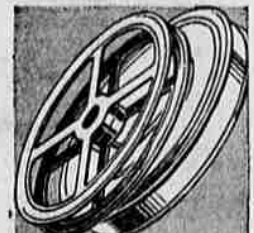
