LEADERS FAIL TO RETURN ON EASY MARKET

NEW YORK, May 18 (AP)—It was another easy-come-easy-go market for stocks today and, while steels and assorted favorites brought home well-filled recovery baskets, a number of leaders ambled into losing territory and failed to return.

Steadier tendencies appeared at the start and, near the close, gains of fractions to a point or so were observed in most departments. Transfers were around 900,000 shares. Bonds were mixed.

Commitments were reinstated here and there on the theory the recent decline had served as a healthy correction of the long forward drive.

Scattered issues managed to make new highs for the year. Among these were Du Pont, National Department Stores, Sylvania Electric and Colgate. Good performers were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Santa Fe, Western Union, Sears Roebuck, American Smelting, Chrysler, United Aircraft, Allied Chemical, Standard Oil (NJ), U. S. Rubber, T. W. Inc., Rapid Transit and Owens-Illinois. Rising steam was lacking for J. I. Case, International Harvester, J. C. Penney and U. S. Gypsum.

Joe Foss, Marine Ace, Gets Medal

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Captain Joseph Foss, United States Marine corps reserve, who has shot down a record bag of 26 Japanese planes, received the congressional medal of honor today from President Roosevelt.

The 28-year-old South Dakota flier was cited for "outstanding heroism and courage," as executive officer of a marine fighting squadron at Guadalcanal.

His citation said he got 23 planes and damaged others severely in almost daily combat with the enemy from October 9 to November 19 last year. He shot down three more last January 15.
