WALLGREN AGAINST JAPANESE IN ARMY

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Senator Mon C. Wallgren (D-Wash.) said yesterday that this country did not "need any Japanese in army uniforms."

He made the statement in announcing he would oppose any plan to permit Japanese, American-born or aliens, to return to the west coast.

"The public generally should realize we are at war and should take no unnecessary chances," he stated.

"Recent questionnaires submitted to attorneys in evacuation centers reveal the fact that many of the American-born Japanese, who legally are considered citizens of the United States, have declared that their first loyalty is to Japan."

"With that sort of a situation I think that it would be very unwise to take any chance and permit Japanese to return to the west coast."

ALTURAS—According to an announcement by Charles Lederer, chairman of the Modoc county defense council, another activity is being incorporated in the civilian defense program. Hereafter, all phases of the volunteer forest, range, and farm fire protection program will fall under the forest and range fire fighters service—otherwise commonly known as the FFFS.

State FFFS Coordinator W. I. Hutchinson, with the approval of J. E. Elliott, supervisor of the Modoc national forest, and Charles Lederer, has designated George S. James, fire control officer of the Modoc, to be the local county coordinator. John C. Hays, Modoc county farm advisor, was selected to be associate coordinator.
