## OVERTIME PAY SUITS FILED ON WEYERHAEUSER

PORTLAND, May 19 (AP)—Seven suits for overtime pay, all based on charges of violations by employers of the fair labor standards act of 1938, were filed yesterday in federal district court.

Tony Zitto, camp cook, plaintiff in three cases, asks a total of \$4638 in overtime pay from three logging companies, \$1246 from the Weyerhaeuser Timber company at whose camp 40 miles west of Klamath Falls he worked from October 24, 1938, to May 13, 1939. Another suit is for \$878 from the Lamm Lumber company near Chiloquin.

Charles X. Zimmerman, also a logging camp cook, asks overtime totaling \$1342, including \$135 allegedly due him for work in a Weyerhaeuser camp near Chiloquin in 1940. Another suit asks \$1206 for work in a Weyerhaeuser camp near Klamath Falls in 1941-42.

Two similar suits against the Weyerhaeuser company were filed by Felix Rousseau, asking \$1851 for overtime put in at a camp near Beatty in 1941, and by Herman O. Stevens, \$243, for work in a camp near Keno in 1939.

All suits were filed by James Landye, Portland attorney.
