

UAW STRIKES CLOSE THREE AUTO PLANTS

DETROIT, May 20 (AP)—Strikes by members of the United Automobile Workers (CIO) who claimed that collective bargaining had "completely broken down" caused the closing of three plants of Chrysler corporation here today affecting some 14,500 workers.

Approximately 4000 employees of the Kerecheval and Jefferson plants walked out at 10 a. m. and established picket lines at gates of the factories. Two hours later a Chrysler spokesman said the corporation was forced to close the Dodge main plant after some 3500 of its 10,500 day shift employees walked out.

The spokesman said, concerning the Kerecheval-Jefferson walkout, "the strike undoubtedly is authorized by the union and was carefully organized. Four thousand men don't walk out of their own accord."

Ed Carey, president of the UAW-CIO Chrysler Local 7, contended that "agitation" by the management caused what the union insisted was a "spontaneous demonstration."

Coal Miners Strike In Protest Over Lack of Contract

PITTSBURGH, May 20 (AP)—Strikes of soft coal miners protesting their lack of a working contract spread in Pennsylvania and broke out in Ohio and Kentucky today, leaving more than 6000 men idle and 14 mines closed.

Eleven pits were closed in United Mine Workers district 2 (Central Pennsylvania), which comprises 5000 members.

Fire Reduces Turkey Supply

EUGENE, May 20 (AP)—Lane county's potential supply of turkeys for the winter was 8000 less today after fire of undetermined origin Tuesday destroyed that number of young turks and a brooder house on the ranch of Don Owen, west of Eugene.

Owen, who operates two ranches in partnership with his brother Elton, said the loss was between \$10,000 and \$15,000. The two Owens are well known in Oregon wrestling circles, Don serving as matchmaker for the Eugene wrestling commission.

Jungle Patrol Finds Oasis Of Modern Comfort in Hills

A SOUTH PACIFIC BASE, May 20 (AP)—An American patrol, exploring the jungles and mountain ridges of Guadalcanal, from which the Japanese were driven last February, discovered an unexpected oasis of modern living comfort.

Capt. David P. Ritchie of Everett, Wash., telling a tale more tourist than military, reports his 20-man patrol toiled nine hours along a ridge-climbing trail. The going was so tough that two men had to fall out. Those who pushed on finally

reached a wide clearing. In the clearing they saw a trim five-room bamboo house set in a neat and well-kept lawn enhanced by flower beds and lemon and lime trees.

A well-educated Fiji native welcomed Captain Ritchie and his men. He explained he was overseer for the Australian owners of the luxurious plantation home. The owners fled when the Japs had invaded.

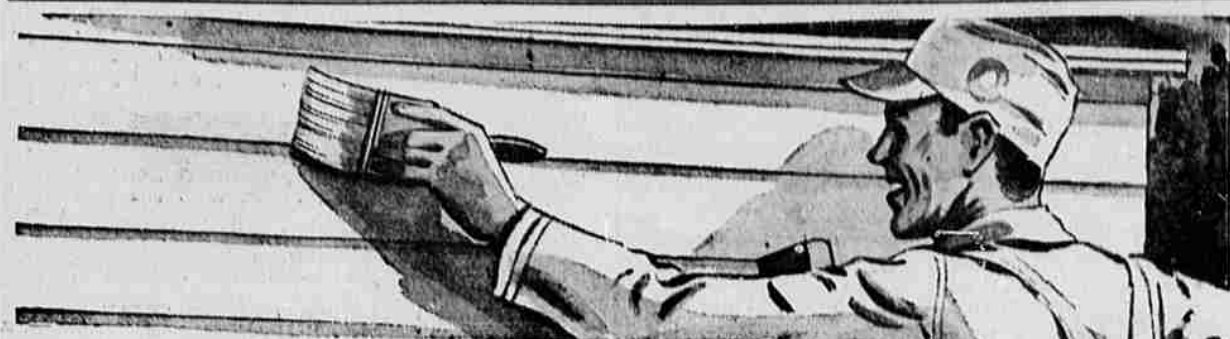
Armenian women, instead of preserving jelly in jars, spread it on cloth, dry it, and roll it up like a rug. The "rugs" are stored for future use.
